

Growers Vote Next Week On 1940 AAA Committees

Series of Township Meetings to be Held to Select Officials to Allot Control Quotas; Qualifications, Requirements Given.

A series of township meetings for growers under AAA control regulations was announced today by J. W. Sanders, county agent and AAA supervisor for Vance county, at which time committees will be elected by the growers to serve during 1940 in making acreage allotments. One meeting will be held in every township except Nutbush, which will join with Middleburg.

The Sanders statement said "any person having an interest in a farm or crop is eligible to vote provided he signs a certificate of membership stating his intention of complying with the program in 1940." It also appealed to all growers to attend these local meetings and assist in selecting the most able farmers available and justify the faith the government has in their ability to manage their own farm program.

Qualifications that must be possessed by committeemen are set forth in the statement, one being that such candidate cannot be one who holds any Federal or State or major county office.

Among the duties of committeemen are those of determining farm acreage allotments, normal yields and soil building goals, and the fixing of marketing quotas where such are applicable and to handle local administration of commodity loans and wheat crop insurance, and "such other duties as may be prescribed by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration."

Following is the full statement of Mr. Sanders about the election of committeemen and the duties of those who named:

Committeemen to serve in connection with the 1940 agricultural conservation program are to be elected at an election meeting to be held in the various communities as follows:

Townsville, Wednesday, October 25, 2:30 p. m., Taylor's store.

Danney, Thursday, October 26, 10 a. m., Danney school.

Watkins, Thursday, October 26, 2:30 p. m., Renn's store.

Middleburg-Nutbush, Friday, October 27, 10 a. m., Middleburg Community House.

Kittrell, Friday, October 27, 2:30 p. m., Zeb Vance school.

Henderson, Saturday, October 28, 11 a. m., court house.

Williamsboro, Monday, October 30, 10 a. m., Wilson's store.

Sandy Creek, Monday, October 30, 2:30 p. m., Aycock school.

Any person having an interest in a farm or crop is eligible to vote provided he signs a certificate of membership stating his intention of complying with the program in 1940.

It is the duty of every producer to come to this election meeting and with the assistance of fellow farmers select the most able farmers available and justify the faith the government has in their ability to manage their own farm program.

To qualify as a committeeman a person must:

(1) Be a resident of community.

(2) Be engaged in farming and derive a substantial part of income directly from farming.

(3) Sign certificate of membership for 1940.

(4) Not be holding any Federal, State, or major county office.

(5) Not during current year have been an officer or employee of any political organization.

Duties of committeemen are to:

(1) Determine farm acreage allotments, normal yields, and soil-building goals.

(2) Determine farm marketing quotas, when applicable; to handle local administration of commodity loans and wheat crop insurance.

(3) Assist in explaining to farmers the purposes and provisions of the program; and perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

In order for the Agricultural Adjustment program to be administered most successfully, farmers should elect:

(1) Men familiar with farming conditions in the county and community and who are successful in their own farming operations.

(2) Men with ability to assist in educational work in connection with the program; explain to farmers its purposes and aims, show how allotments and yields are established, and point out ways in which the provisions of the program can be best adapted to the needs of individual farms.

(3) Men who will further the objective of the program through the establishment of equitable allotments and yields, and proper soil-building goals, that will reflect painstaking

and impartial consideration of all facts pertaining to the establishment of such allotments, yields, and goals.

FETLERS OFFERING UNUSUAL PROGRAM

Talented Family, Exiled From Russia, Appears at First Baptist

An unusual program of instrumental and vocal music from many lands will be presented by the Rambov Family, composed of 12 of the 13 children of Rev. William Fetler, exiled preacher from Russia, and Mrs. Fetler, in concert at 7:30 p. m. tonight at the First Baptist church. It was announced today.

The group will appear at the First Baptist church in Oxford Friday night.

Russian folk songs, religious anthems, folk songs of several European countries—the group has made its home in 12 different countries and speaks seven languages—and a talk by Rev. Mr. Fetler on "The Revolution and Religion in Russia," constitute their unique program.

Little James (Jacky) Fetler, eight year old bandmaster, will lead the orchestra in several numbers. The 12 children—instruments include Daniel, 24, trumpet; Timothy, 23, clarinet; Lydia, 22, cornet; Paul, 19, trombone; John, 17, second trombone; Philip, 16, bass horn; Elizabeth, 15, alto horn; Andrew, 14, baritone horn; David, 12, cornet; Peter, nine, drums; James (Jacky), eight, bandmaster, and Joseph, five, the vymphals.

Opening with a Latvian march conducted by Jacky, the program will continue with "The Twelve Robbers", the old Russian cloister song; "Concerto in B Flat Major", a clarinet solo; the ever popular "Russian Volga Song, Ey Ucheyem"; Richard Wagner's "The Pilgrim's Chorus" from "Tannhauser", arranged by Daniel.

"Jamshid-Nik", Russian coachman's song, will be followed by "Bethlehem", a Czech song featuring trombone solo by Paul; a spiritual, "I Ain't a'gonna Grieve My Lord Any More"; the Gospel according to St. John 3:16 in thirteen languages; "The Rainbow March", composed by Paul; "Mein Herzchen soll Sein, Wie Die Lillie so Rein", German nursery song, and "They Come From the East and West".
