Gainesville, Fla., March 6.—(AP)—The University of Florida football squad refused to report for practice Tuesday and issued a statement saying players would participate in no further spring practice sessions until the coaching situation had been settled.

Head Coach Josh Cody resigned to accept the position of line coach at Temple university in Philadelphia, and there has been no announcement as to when a successor would be chosen.

The players in their statement left at the athletic office declared it would be useless to continue further spring practice under the Pittsburgh style of play "if it is not going to be employed again next year," and that should another system be inaugurated there would undoubtedly be a second spring session.

Spring practice began February 5, and was to have lasted six weeks if more.

Notification of DiMaggio's acceptance came to Manager Joe McCarthy by telephone from President E. G. Barrow in New York. No announcement was made of the deal until Tuesday.

DiMaggio, the American league's batting champion last season and recipient of the league's "most valuable player" award for 1939, has been one of baseball's most persistent holdouts since he joined the Yankees in 1936.

Jamerson Never Played Sport He Now Coaches

Chapel Hill, March 6.—Dick Jamerson, Carolina's genial swimming coach, who has just piloted the Tar Heels to their first Conference swimming championship, never participated in the sport during his student days at Rye Institute.

It was when he took his first coaching job at Oberlin College five years ago he was assigned to Coach Oberlin's swimming team. There he had several successful teams before coming to Carolina in the fall of 1938 as an assistant in football and coach of the newly organized tank team.

Taking over a squad of 20 inexperienced candidates last winter wasn't an easy job and Coach Jamerson knew it. But after losing the first three meets of the season to Virginia, V. M. I., and Duke, the Tar Heels beat Washington and Lee and N. C. State and held Duke to a closer score in the second meeting of the two teams.

Coach Jamerson entered seven members of his team in the annual Southern Conference meet at Raleigh but the inexperienced Tar Heel performers finished next to last in the team scoring with seven other Conference institutions.

Seven lettermen and a handful of untried sophomores reported to Coach Jamerson in January for Carolina's second swimming edition. The Tar Heel mentor went to work right away and his charges got off to a flying start with a 65-19 victory over Virginia Tech. Involving with every meet, the Tar Heels avenged the Virginia and V. M. I. licking and took N. C. State and William and Mary in stride.

Near the end of the season the Tar Heels received their only defeat of the season, losing 51-24 to Florida, Southeastern Conference champions for the last three years. Carolina, however, finished strong by beating Washington and Lee and Duke, thus evening matters with their arch rivals from Durham.

It was not until the Southern Conference meet that the Carolina tankmen really hit their peak. Rated second to Clemson's defending champions in the pro-meet speculation the Tar Heels surprised their most ardent supporters by rolling up a record team score of 60 points compared to Duke's 34 and Clemson's 27, nearest challengers.

Fleming Stone, a Raleigh boy, and Jim Barclay of Spring Valley, N. Y., were Carolina's individual luminaries. A brilliant sprinter, Stone scored 72 1-4 points in the eight-meet dual season and won the 50 and 100-meter sprints in the Conference meet. Barclay won the 200-meter free style and placed third in the 400-meter free style in the

Conference meet. He was second to Stone in scoring with 42 points. Coming up from the freshmen, Barclay's 1941 swimming prospects appear brighter than at the start of the season. Barclay and Stone are the new co-captains of next year's team.
