British-Russian relations, severely strained by extension of the British blockade to the Pacific, were made more difficult today by British announcement that two Russian merchant ships, held in Hong Kong on suspicion of carrying contraband, had been turned over to the French for inspection.

#### Contraband Inspection To Be Made

Allied Relations With Russia Given Fresh Prominence As Two Vessels, Intercepted in Far East, Are Transferred.

London, March 29.—(AP)—Great Britain threw allied relations with Soviet Russia into fresh prominence today by announcing that she was turning over to French authorities two Russian freighters which were intercepted in the Far East enroute to Vladivostok, one of them from the United States, on suspicion of carrying contraband.
