

Democratic Convention Tomorrow

Delegates to State Convention To Be Elected; Third Term Resolution Anticipated

Democrats of Vance county will meet in convention at the court house here tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock for the purpose of electing delegates to the State convention and for transaction of such other business as may come before it. Following the convention, the new county executive committee will meet to elect a county chairman.

Among the most promising developments is the indicated intention of some Democrats to offer a resolution of endorsement of President Roosevelt for a third term. Some opposition to that move has been expressed, but whether it will become operative on the floor of the convention remained to be seen.

Chairman M. H. Stone, of the county executive committee, is to call the meeting to order, and a chairman and a secretary will be elected. Interest attaches to the selection of a county chairman following the convention tomorrow. The executive committee consists of precinct chairmen throughout the county, and there are thirteen of these. Some precincts last Saturday named new chairmen, so that there will be some change in the personnel of the committee. Some speculation has also been heard

as to the choice for the party's leader during the next two years. Whether Mr. Stone definitely will or will not wish to succeed himself has not been announced. It is known, however, that at least one other Democrat has been mentioned as desirous of the chairmanship, and that some effort in his behalf has been rumored.

DEMONSTRATION OF BLUE MOLD CONTROL TO BE HELD MONDAY

The fourth in a series of demonstrations of blue mold control in tobacco plant beds was announced today by J. W. Sanders, Vance county farm agent, for 4 o'clock Monday afternoon at the farm of M. T. Greenway, in the Carey's Chapel community. Two demonstrations were scheduled for today and a third is to be held tomorrow morning at 9:30 o'clock at the C. U. Samford farm near Lenoirville.

The demonstration Monday afternoon will show the results obtained through the spray method of blue mold control. The other demonstration plots have been treated by the approved fumigation method.

County Agent Sanders said today that results obtained at the Greenway farm have been very satisfactory and that he believes farmers in the county will be interested to note the comparison between beds which were treated and those which were not treated.

Tomorrow Is Last Day For Registration

Final, last-minute efforts to get every person possible registered for the coming primaries were being made today, with only one more day left in which names can be put on the books. A new registration is being held throughout Vance county, and, after starting slowly, enrollment has shown a definite pick-up in the past few days, it has been indicated.

Registrars will be at the polling places throughout the county tomorrow to enroll those who apply and who can qualify. In some instances registrars are understood to have been going from house to house in their district to get names on the lists this week. This effort has resulted in many additions.

Chairman W. A. Lucas, of the State Board of Elections, has appealed to voters throughout the State to register, and Chairman M. H. Stone, of the Vance county committee, has supplemented this appeal locally. Workers for some of the candidates for governor have also been active in the registration effort, as well as the few candidates for county offices.

Registration books close tomorrow afternoon at sunset, and those whose names have not been added to the lists by that time will not be permitted to vote on May 25.
