(By The Associated Press.) Cigarette tobacco growers took time out today from their task of preparing a multi-million dollar crop to vote on production limitations designed by the government to bolster sagging income.

Some 250,000 farmers, tenants and share-croppers were expected to indicate their preference on three bright leaf tohacco plans presented through the Agricultural Adjustment Administration referendum.

The first, urged by farm officials throughout the six-state belt as the best influence on depressed markets, would establish acreage quotas for 1941, 1942 and 1943.



Germany turned radio propaganda guns on the British public today, warning of the death and destruction it may face if it persists in refusing to take Adolf Hitler's "final"


