Denny Favored As Chairman

Raleigh, Aug. 2.—(AP)—J. Melville Broughton, of Raleigh, Democratic nominee for governor, disclosed yesterday that he would ask the North Carolina Democratic executive committee to elect his campaign manager, Emery B. Denny, of Gastonia...

The election will be held here August 14, Broughton added. He said the date had been decided at a conference attended by himself, Governor Hoey and R. Gregg Cherry, of Gastonia, the present party chairman.

At the same time, it was learned authoritatively that certain women leaders in the party had recommended Mrs. Paul P. McCain, of Hoke county, for election as state vice chairman, and that Broughton approved of the recommendation.

Denny would succeed Cherry, a fellow townsman. At present there is a vacancy in the vice chairmanship, since Mrs. W. B. Murphy, of Snow Hill, resigned the post early this year to campaign for A. J. Maxwell, of Raleigh, who ran third in the gubernatorial race.

Frigidaire Makes 100 Pounds of Ice

An interesting experiment with a new 1400 Frigidaire was made several days ago at the Henderson Furniture Company, local Frigidaire dealers. A box large enough to hold 100 pounds of ice was fitted around the unit of a small size Frigidaire and filled with water. The door was sealed and the machine started. At the end of 36 hours the door was opened and it was found that the water had frozen into a solid cake of ice, leaving no doubt as to the freezing qualities of the Frigidaire. It was said that making 100 pounds of ice in 36 hours would be a good job under normal conditions, and that in view of the very warm weather the record made was considered exceptional.
