Washington, Aug. 16.— (AP) President Roosevelt announced today that the United States is "holding conversations" with Great Britain on acquisition of naval and air bases by the United States "with special ref-erence to the Panama Canal."

The Chief Executive made this announcement at his press conference but cautioned reporters repeatedly not to tie it up with any speculation about the release of American de-

stryoers to Great Britain. Voluntarily, Mr. Roosevelt author-ized the following direct quotation

on the negotiations: "The United States government is holding conversations with the government of the British empire with regard to the acquisition of naval and air bases by the United States for American hemisphere defense with special reference to the Panama

and fighters. And then, as Germany wirlessed to London and the world that more were yet to come, this capital of the empire itself was drawn into the theatre of action.
