

Man Dies Of Auto Injury On Saturday

Harry Krakow, of New York, Succumbs at Hospital; Unidentified Soldier in Car Disappears; Dead Man Had Been to Miami.

Harry Krakow, 34, of 305 West 97th Street, New York, died in North Carolina hospital today of injuries received in mid-afternoon Saturday.

An unidentified soldier reported to have been riding in a car which was said to have disappeared from the highway up by a road near New York.

The deceased was survived by his widow, Mrs. Anna Krakow, and two sons, Saul and George, all of New York.

The body was held at the Kohn Funeral Home for shipment tonight to New York.

Krakow was said to have been in the employ of the Kohn Brothers, New York, and had been in the area of the highway where the car disappeared.

The car, a 1938 model, was found on a straightaway on the highway, with no indication of a crash or to the probable cause of the accident.

Krakow's mother, Mrs. M. Krakow, a. m. today. He was buried with him at the end.

Hospital Gets High Rating

Marla Parham hospital in Henderson has again been put on the favored list of hospitals in the country approved by the American College of Surgeons.

The record announced today covers the entire State, and shows the local hospital to have capacity for 47 patients. It is rated as a general hospital under control of a board of trustees with community ownership.

Granville hospital in Oxford is on the list as meeting the minimum requirements.

Duke hospital in Durham is the largest in the State, with capacity of 750, with the exception of the government hospital at Oteen, with a capacity for 850. This is for tubercular patients.

Rating of this sort by the American College of Surgeons does not carry any financial assistance of any kind, merely extending a credited standard of having met certain requirements.

Duke hospital is listed as one of only two in the State conducting cancer clinics. The other is the cancer clinic of the Guilford County Medical Society.

Work will begin tomorrow in Vance county on the county-wide Bang's disease eradication program which was started today by Dr. A. D. Gregg, county health officer.

The program is under the joint sponsorship of the county health department, the county board of commissioners, the bureau of Animal Husbandry of the State Department of Agriculture, and the United States Department of Agriculture.

Dr. N. B. Tyler and Dr. Robert G. Lee, veterinarians of the State bureau of Animal Husbandry, arrived in Henderson this morning to inaugurate the program and it is expected that the actual testing of cattle will begin tomorrow.

Under the disease eradication program, all cattle six months of age or older will be tested for Bang's disease and all infected animals will be condemned and destroyed.

Dr. Gregg urged all cattle owners in the county to be prepared for the visit of the inspectors and to give all possible assistance in the testing of their cattle.

Sub-Freezing Temperature Is First Here

Last night brought the coldest weather of the winter so far, with a minimum temperature of 27 reported at 5 a. m. today.

The highest temperature of Sunday was 52, and the mercury slid to a point almost exactly half that for the minimum of the night.

Low temperatures prevailed most of last week in this section. Skies were overcast, too, most of the time, and weather outside was very disagreeable.

Heavy Break Of Tobacco Is Offered

One of the heaviest breaks of the season was reported on the Henderson tobacco market today with some 500 to 600 thousand pounds of leaf on sale.

Prices were reported to be higher than at the end of last week. Through last Friday the market had sold slightly more than 9,400,000 pounds of leaf for the season.

Some estimates are that about half or possibly a little more than half of the season's crop has been made.

Forecasts of the season have been that the Henderson market would sell some 15 to 20 million pounds.

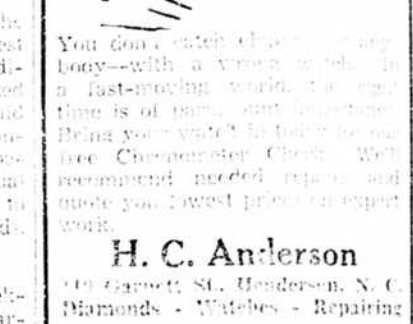
