

Sidney Lane, Jr., Is Not To Lead Chest Campaign

Directors Balk on Approving Salvation Army Request for \$2,500; All Other Askings Approved in Sums Sought.

S. J. Lane, Jr., was named chairman of the Vance County Community Chest drive at a meeting of the directors at that organization Wednesday evening. At which time budgets were approved for all agencies and activities that will share the fund except the Salvation Army, of which further consideration will be given at a meeting tonight.

Mr. Lane announced today, however, that because of pressure of business he had found it would not be possible for him to direct the campaign and he was resigning. The directors will consider the resignation and a successor will then be named again tonight to act as the Salvation Army's representative.

Budgets for the year were approved included: Boy Scouts, \$500; Girl Scouts, \$250; P. T. A. lunch room and underprivileged children work, \$750; WPA recreation fund, \$200; complete office, \$250. The Salvation Army had asked for \$2,500, which would have made a total of \$4,450 had it been approved.

The budget proposals were voted on last night.

Mrs. E. R. Austin, secretary, reported a balance of \$907.76 on hand in local banks to the credit of the chest.

Groups representing both the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts attended the meeting and urged the chest directors to reconsider the request of last week when these organizations were omitted in favor of other groups not charity organizations.

Discussion tonight on chest plans reported by the directors that they would not support the chest if the

scout groups were not included. R. E. Clements presided at the meeting as a vice president, in the absence of E. O. Falkner, chairman of the chest organization.

Negro Sent To Roads For Making Whisky

Roy Thompson, Negro, was convicted of a charge of manufacturing whisky today in county court before Recorder R. E. Clements, and was given six months on the roads. Thompson was captured Wednesday afternoon about 5 o'clock at a still in Kittrell township by Sheriff L. I. Swanson and Deputy E. A. Cottrell. Thompson was in the act of bringing up wood at the time the officers closed in.

Three barrels of beer and 50-gallon still were seized by the raiding officers. William Judkin, Negro, was given 30 days on the roads for being drunk, suspended upon payment of the costs. Herman Shaw, Negro, was guilty of being drunk. He had the choice of 30 days on the roads or paying the costs.

At yesterday's session of the court, Arthur Amaze, a tourist, was charged with careless and reckless driving, and prayer for judgment was continued upon payment of the costs.

Tomorrow night's dinner will be at Hotel Warren at 8:45 o'clock.

The first meeting here is one of a number to be held or already held in this and other states. They will climax in a meeting to be held at Duke University in December on the occasion of Duke University Day.

T. W. McCracken is president of the Vance county alumni group, and has been in charge of local arrangements for the dinner.

40 Names Added To Registration Lists in County

Receipt of approximately forty transfers from other counties of Vance county residents who registered elsewhere in the selective service registration of October 16 swelled to more than 3,750 the number on the lists of the Vance county selective service board today.

The board announced that 3,713 men were listed yesterday, and the names received today are to be added to that number.

Everything is being made ready for local handling of the order numbers will be drawn next Tuesday in Washington in the national lottery. It was stated today at the selective service board office in the postoffice building, but actual assignment of the order numbers will not be made locally until official orders are received from Washington. The order numbers will determine in the order in which men are called for a year's military training.

Rotary Head Will Visit Local Club

W. Carter Darrow, of Tarboro, governor of the 189th district of Rotary International, will pay an official visit to the Henderson club next Tuesday evening. It was learned today. During his visit he will also meet with S. T. Peace, Sr., president, and E. F. Shaw, secretary, and directors and other officials in consultation about matters relating to club administration and Rotary service activities.

This is Mr. Darrow's first official visit to the local club since he was elected to the office, which election was confirmed at the 1940 Rotary International convention in Havana, Cuba. He will continue to serve until the 1941 convention in Denver.

The 189th Rotary district, of which the local club is a part, consists of 49 clubs with a membership of approximately 1,700. Rotary has 5,000 clubs scattered in 60 counties of the world and grouped in 149 districts.

581 Blood Tests Raise Total to 1,357 in County

Blood specimens for Wassermann tests for syphilis were taken from 581 men, registrants under the national selective service act, yesterday at the offices of the Vance county health department. This number, added to the 776 previously sent to the laboratory of the State Health Department, brings to 1,357 the total number of tests to be made for men registered in this county.

Dr. A. D. Gregg, county health officer, said that the last day on which specimens will be taken is next Wednesday, and he urged all registrants to report at the health department at that time.

Negro Killed When Hit By Ride At Fair

Fred Douglas Hughes, 22-year-old Negro, was fatally injured last night about 10:30 o'clock at the Vance County Colored Fair, now in progress here, when he was struck back of the head by a swing on a ride called "Dipsy-Doodle". Hughes was rushed to Jubilee hospital, and died there about 6 o'clock this morning.

Two eye witnesses, Arthur C. Polle and Harriet C. Poole, told officers that they saw the swing strike Hughes, and Hughes fall.

Coroner A. P. Paschall is conducting an investigation. Sheriff L. L. Swanson is conducting an investigation of the part of his office.

The sheriff said the ride was being operated at the time by Russell DeHate, and that E. W. Avery is the owner.

The officer declared that Hughes evidently had leaned over a guard fence about the ride, and was struck by one of the swings attached.

Draft Act Is Subject For Rotary

J. H. Bridges, chairman of the Selective Service Board of Vance county, was the speaker at the regular weekly meeting of the Rotary club Tuesday evening at the Vance Hotel.

J. R. Teague was in charge of the program, and presented the speaker. Mr. Bridges told of the act, how it applies to Vance county, and said that approximately 50 men would be called from this county in the first draft.

The cards are numbered, and as soon as the drawing is made in Washington, he said, questionnaires will be sent to the men to be classified in four classes with the board determining the classifications.

A drafter, the speaker continued, may protest his classification, with his protest in writing, and a hearing will be accorded him.

A total of 244,806 pounds of tobacco was sold Wednesday on the Henderson tobacco market for \$45,999.65 for an average price of \$18.79. Prices rebounded sharply from the level of Tuesday, partly due, it is understood, to somewhat better quality of leaf on sale.

The figures were announced by Smith H. Young, sales supervisor for the market, who estimated today's offerings at around 300,000 pounds, with prices holding firm.
