Stewart Says Albania May Slow Axis Balkan Drive



Mrs. Roy Dixon, teacher in the Durham high school, is president of the North Carolina Central District of the Association of the North Carolina Education Association and will preside at the 18th annual convention of the organization at Durham, Friday, November 8.

They relate that, not long ago the Greeks caught an "Albanian patriot" (a pro-Italian) and chopped his head off. It really happened, probably. But the Greeks just cut the chap wasn't a patriot. They say he was a bandit and that the Albanians were delighted to have his head amputated.

Anyway, there are reports that Albania is anti-Italian beyond Rome's denials, and there's no knowing due to the censorship.

The rumors sound probable though. The Albanians are a super liberty-loving people. Their methods of fighting also are decidedly primitive.

In the days before the last World War I was in Turkey, which then was fighting Albania.

The Turks, none too civilized themselves, complained that the Albanians were outright savages. They charged that the Albanian custom when a Turkish prisoner was captured, was to cut his hand off.

The Albanian high command did not deny the accusation, but it deeply resented its implications.

From Antivari (then their capital) they broadcast their explanation.

"When we take a war prisoner," they pointed out, "we haven't the facilities to intern him. Yet we do not want to turn him loose to go on fighting us. Neither do we want to kill him. That would be barbarous. So we put him on his hands and feet, and he keeps his pledge, we cut his hand off."

It's imaginable that Albania may have considered the Greek chopping off of one of its patriots' head a trifle too drastic.

All the same, that's the sort of bunch the axis will have to deal with if it tries to fight its way overland into Greece.

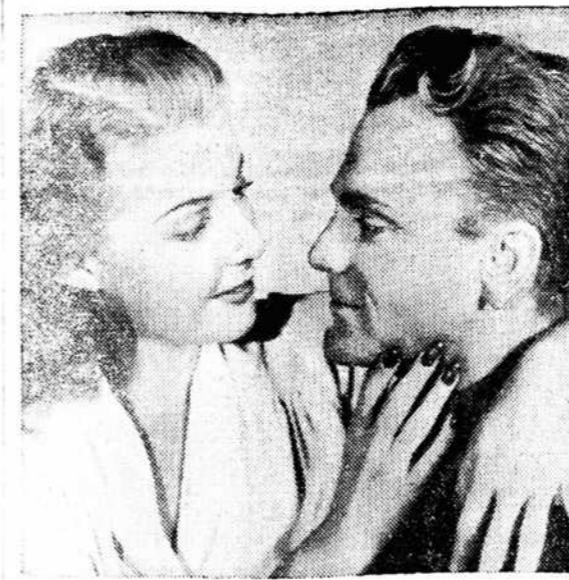

True, I expect the axis will do it. It's no picnic, however.

Market News For The Week

Raleigh, Nov. 2.—Feed markets strengthened slightly during the past week with moderate offerings of wheat feeds and a fair demand for immediate shipment, according to the U. S. and North Carolina Departments of Agriculture.

The index number of wholesale peanut prices was up slightly to 122.3 compared with 111.5 for the previous week and 116.3 for the corresponding week last year.

This week's price range for the new crop peanuts are unusually wide because of the wide range in appearance and meat content.

The season's first North Carolina redskins and Broccoli rabe appeared on the northern wholesale fruit and vegetable markets.

Monthly egg production during the last few months was the largest for those months since 1931. However, in the Raleigh area, paying prices for standard and graded, white, U. S. extra large eggs advanced from 1 to 2 cents per dozen to 35 cents during the period under review and U. S. Standards large 2 cents a dozen to 29 and 32 cents.

At Chicago the recently developed two-way shift in steer prices continued without abatement this week, especially those with weight, working into higher price ground, while heavily good and lower grades lost 2 to 50 cents.
