OXFORD ORPHANAGE POINTS TO RECORD

6,000 Children Trained by Pioneer Institution in Social Welfare Work

The Oxford Orphanage at Oxford, North Carolina, has a record of sixty-seven years of service to the children of North Carolina. Over 6,000 have been cared for and trained and the Home is filled to capacity all the time and has a waiting list. Its graduates and former pupils are in all walks of life and there is no record of a former pupil having been convicted and sentenced for committing a major crime. It is the oldest orphanage in the State and the only fraternal order orphanage in the United States that receives children other than those of the membership of the supporting order.

At the present time 50 percent of the population of the orphanage is of Masonic parentage. The Home possesses valuable buildings, grounds, and equipment and has had no operating deficit for several years. The annual budget for the Orphanage calls for an expenditure of \$1,700,000. This provides shelter, clothing, food, recreation, heat, light, books, school supplies, health program, staff of trained workers, vocational training in several departments, laundry, repairs and upkeep to buildings, grounds and equipment, and experienced case work for a family of more than 330 children.

Superintendent C. K. Proctor announces that the sum of \$10,000.00 is needed this year for operating expenses in order to balance the budget. The Oxford Orphanage is more than a philanthropy—it is an investment in the lives of North Carolina boys and girls who would not otherwise have a chance. It pays to the State and its citizenship the high dividends in character and trained young people. It is an opportunity today for North Carolina citizens to express in a substantial way their desire to help others.

The orphanages of the State use the Thanksgiving season as an occasion to appeal to the citizens of the State for much needed assistance. The superintendent of the Oxford Orphanage announces that the Home is open for visitors each day and hundreds of North Carolina citizens visit this historic spot every year.

R. W. Graber, extension forester of State College, is urging all farmers to place orders for tree seedlings from the State Forest nurseries as early as possible.

The posters will be on display in the library during Book Week. All parents and children throughout the county are invited to come in to see them and the dozens of new books in the Children's Room.

tions of the through block off as his car passed, and many ran along the way trying for a continuing view of the man whose three-time victories have assured his place in history.

The decisiveness of the triumph was reflected in the hourly more complete tabulation of the national popular vote. With 119,163 of the country's 127,235 voting units accounted for, the ballot totals stood: Mr. Roosevelt, 23,956,562; Wendell L. Willkie, 21,591,022.

The President had 39 states to his credit with a total of 463 electoral votes while Willkie mustered nine states and 63 electoral votes. The big possibility of a change in the lineup appeared to rest with Michigan, where late Republican gains cut the Democratic margin to a slender 7,700 with more than 60 districts yet to report.

Power and Light Company Cuts Its Consumer Rates

New low rates for electricity for heating water, and new schedules giving reductions to certain industrial power customers and large commercial service customers will go into effect during the latter part of November in the territory served by the Carolina Power and Light Company, L. V. Sutton, president of the company, announces.

The annual savings as result of the reductions to customers will amount to \$283,000, with North Carolina customers benefiting to the extent of \$218,500 annually and South Carolina customers \$64,500, it was said.

The amendment to the company's residential rate, as approved by the regulatory commissions in North and South Carolina, Mr. Sutton said, "provides for a discount of one-half cent per kilowatt-hour for automatic water heating which will mean a reduction in cost of this class of service of approximately 30 percent, or allow 40 to 50 per cent more of water for the same cost."

The discount for automatic water heating will not be applicable to the first 200 hours of total consumption, which in the case of the average customer is sufficient to take care of bathing, refrigeration, cooking and the usual small appliances, but will apply to a KWH allowance thereafter in accordance with the provisions of the amendment to the residential rate schedule.

The savings to North Carolina customers is divided among classes as follows:
Residential Water Heating... \$76,000
Large Commercial Service... 68,700
Industrial Power Service... 66,000
Municipal Pumping... 6,800

While the new rates go into effect in November savings to customers will not be shown until bills rendered on and after December 15.
