## High Court Upholds Alien Act

### First Week Of Legislature Ends With Little Fuss Made

### Revenue and Appropriations Bills Sent to Committees; Minor Measures Passed.

Raleigh, Jan. 20.—The General Assembly has assembled its first full week, and all there is little to indicate what matters it may still stir up enough to get in the lead next week.

True, the congressional and territorial districts reassignment bill have been introduced in the hands of the committee charged with their consideration, and equally true, no statewide liquor referendum bill has yet been introduced.

So far as things stand, the legislature is in a position to get on with its work, and it is generally felt that progress will be made at least as rapid as in previous years.

Revenue and appropriations bills have gone to the committee on revenue and appropriations work has been done in other branches.

The economy group, which will be led, as in 1939, by Dr. J. B. Pruner, Irving Trust, has not begun swinging its axes, because nothing has yet come to vote.

Raleigh, Jan. 20.—With many and more attention being centered on government revenue, both federal and state, it is interesting to compare the ratio of increased expenditures of the two agencies.

It is found that since 1900, when the ratio of state to federal expenditures was 1 to 1, the ratio has become 49 to 1, while for the same period federal spending increased 19 times.

There is a different story when only the last ten years are considered. Since 1930 state spending has not quite doubled while federal expenditures are nearly three times as much.

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### State Law Invalidated

### Supreme Court Also Refuses to Review Order Directed Against GMAC Advertising.

Washington, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today said that passage of the 1935 Federal law requiring registration of alien residents in 1935 was unconstitutional.

Justice Brandeis delivered the opinion, which said that the registration law was unconstitutional because it violated the 14th Amendment's prohibition against state laws which deprive citizens of life, liberty or property without due process of law.

The court also refused to review an order directed against General Motors Advertising, which had been issued by the Federal government.

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### Presidential Oath Taken Third Time

"Our Strong Purpose is to Protect and Perpetuate the Integrity of America," President Says in Inaugural Address.

Washington, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Franklin Delano Roosevelt took the presidential oath of office at 12:11 1/2 a. m. e. s. t. today to become the nation's first third-term president.

Henry Agard Wallace of Iowa took the oath of office as vice president of the United States at 12:19 p. m. e. s. t.

Washington, Jan. 20.—(AP)—President Roosevelt declared today that "democracy is not dying" and "cannot die," and to thousands massed before the nation's capitol for his inaugural and to other millions throughout the land he proclaimed this purpose of his next four years in office.

"In the face of great perils never before encountered our strong purpose is to protect and to perpetuate the integrity of democracy.

"For this we muster the spirit of America and the faith of America.

"We do not retreat. We are not content to stand still. As Americans we go forward in the service of our country by the will of God."

Intensified by wars abroad, the grave responsibilities of guarding the nation's security came a third time to Mr. Roosevelt in inaugural ceremonies traditional to America's free elections.

A bright sun shone on flags and banners along gaily decorated Pennsylvania Avenue. Mr. Roosevelt's path to his unprecedented third oath of office, and blazed a greeting to thousands gathered in freezing temperatures to shout their acclamation of the Chief Executive.

The high and the humble rubbed shoulders in this national celebration of a new presidential term.

Symbolizing the gravity of international tension was a parade overtop of military might, marshalled for review by the commander in chief.

The high point of the day's historic ceremonies was reserved for the Capitol's broad plaza, where Mr. Roosevelt, standing before the lofty dome, pronounced by the statue of

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
