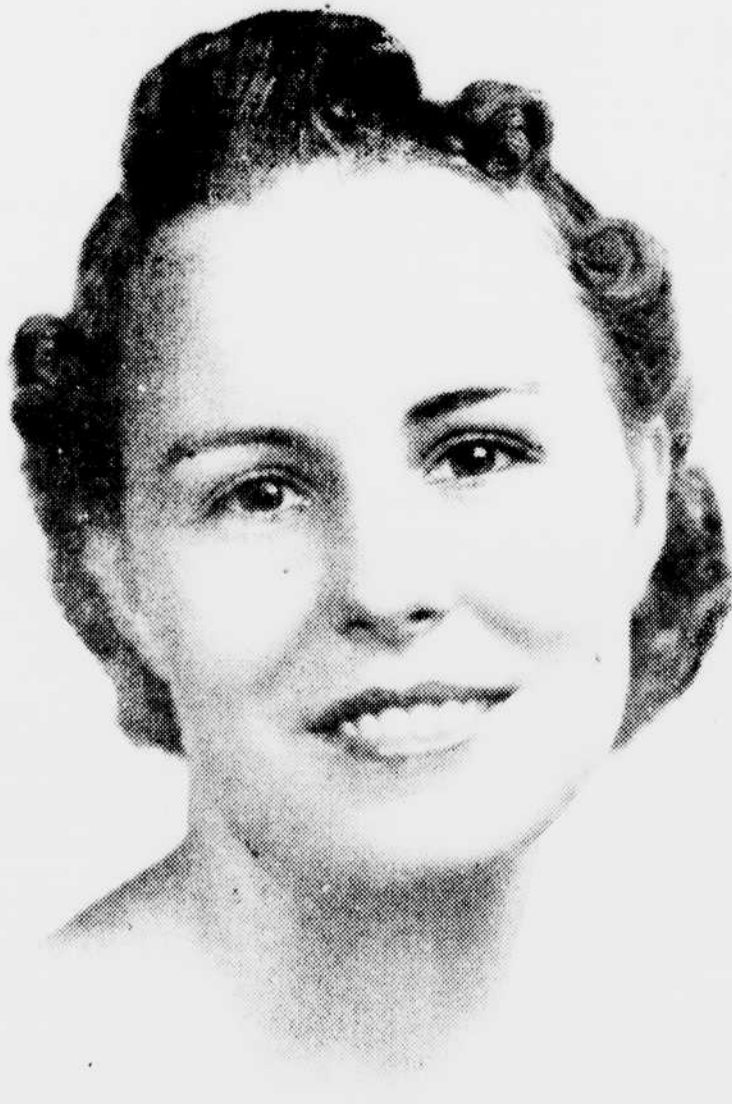
MARRIAGE LICENSES TO SIXTEEN COUPLES

In December there were 26 white and 14 colored for a total of forty in all.

"Baptist Safeguards" Pointed Out

Speaking on "Baptist Safeguards," the Rev. E. Norfleet Gardner, pastor of the First Baptist church, yesterday morning made a general survey of the various countries where Baptist liberty has been overrun and then named four safeguards for the church in "a time like this when liberty is imperiled." The occasion for the message was observance of Baptist World Alliance Sunday.

Rev. Gardner outlined the safeguards as:

"First, the doctrine of the individual's right of direct access to God, and the privilege of worshipping God as he pleases; enlightened conscience and four opened minds to seek the will of God;

"Third, the democracy of Baptist churches—no one person has authority, there is an equality of believers; we cannot impose the spiritual dictatorship on any other person; and

"Fourth, willingness of Baptist churches to cooperate with other religious forces in bringing the Kingdom of God on earth."

Rev. Mr. Gardner III, Rev. E. Norfleet Gardner, pastor of the First Baptist church, is in Maria Parham hospital with influenza, it was learned today. He was unable to preach at the evening service at his church and the sermon was given by Rev. E. R. Nelson.

Garden Pilgrimage March 28 To May 29

Raleigh, Feb. 3.—The fourth annual Garden Pilgrimage, sponsored by the Garden Club of North Carolina, will be held this year from March 28 through May 29. It was announced today by Mrs. C. A. Gosney of Raleigh, Garden Pilgrimage chairman, January in the basic program, and again with the suggestion in the program of the State Department of Agriculture and Development.

Thirty-three garden clubs, and communities participating in the pilgrimage, this year, the largest number ever to take part in the event. Last year 26 communities participated in the pilgrimage, more than 3,000 persons, many of them from other States, visited the hundreds of gardens and homes that were open to the public. A larger number of people, both from the city and country, will visit the many gardens that will be open in the course of the pilgrimage, from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. on the several months of the pilgrimage department, which is being held on the 1941 circuit.

The 1941 Garden Pilgrimage will open March 28 and 29 in Wilmington, where many lovely gardens and homes will be open for inspection. The New Bern garden club will open its home and garden March 29 and 30. It will be the only date the garden club will be possible to visit many of the most beautiful and interesting gardens in New Bern.

Gardens and homes will then open in other parts of the State from east to west in the following order: Asheville on May 28 and 29.

Wilmington, March 28-29; New Bern, March 29 and 30; Goldsboro, April 3-4; Mount Olive, April 3-4; Fayetteville, April 3-4; Weldon, April 9-10; Red Springs, April 10; April 10-11; Rocky Mount, April 10-11; Durham, April 11-12; Rocky Mount, April 13-14; Raleigh, April 13-14; Roanoke Rapids, April 14-15; Macon, April 15-16; Oxford Gardens, between Southern Pine and Pinebluff, sponsored by Southern Garden Club, April 16-17; Aberdeen, April 17-18; Henderson, April 17-18; Burlington, April 17-18; Tryon, April 17-18; Raleigh, April 19-20.

Greensboro, April 21-22; Salisbury, April 22-23; Thomasville, April 23-24; Hillboro, April 24; Hill Point, April 24-25; Greensboro, April 25-26; April 25-26; Winston-Salem, April 25-26; Greensboro, April 29-30; Red Springs, April 30-May 1; State Hill College, May 2; Green River Plantation, near Independence, May 27-28; and Asheville, May 29-29.
