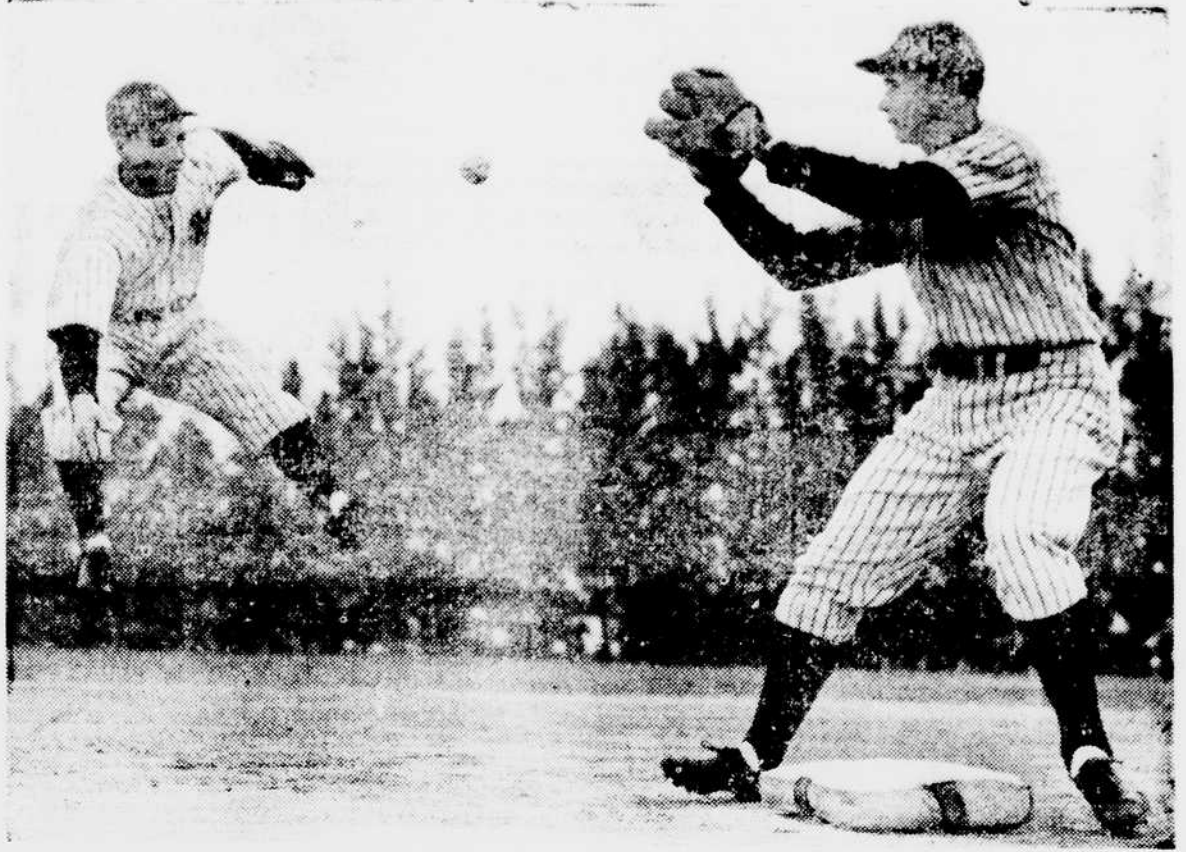
UNC GRAPPLERS OFF FOR TOURNAMENT

Minor Cases Decided By High Court

Raleigh, Feb. 27.—There wasn't any case of outstanding public interest or importance among the approximately twenty cases in which the supreme court handed down decisions this week—its first "opinion day" of the spring term.

Not does there appear to be anything in the nature of a spectacular hearing in prospect for the court's session next week, when a dozen appeals (two criminal, ten civil) will be heard from the Fourth and Seventeenth districts.

Case No. 1 on the spring term docket might have been of more than ordinary interest had the seven justices gone into the real merits of the case propounded—especially in view of the evident tide of opinion, both judicial and legislative, against extending the powers and functions of "regulatory" associations of trades, businesses, and professions.

L. A. Muse was indicted in Haywood county (home of that arch-foe of "commissions", former State Senator Chester A. Coghurn) for violation of the plumbers' commission law. He contested the statute's constitutionality and when he lost before the superior court he permitted a hearing of the evidence before the judge alone, then appealed, asserting the constitutional point.

His conviction was reversed, but because the court held he could not waive trial by jury. The justices refused even to consider the main question, which will likely come up again on a second appeal.

The court held that certain Englehard citizens will have to pay taxes for construction of a town building, with WPA and Hyde county aid. The town hadn't had an election since 1915, but its former mayor and its still-living commissioners set up a de facto town government in order to undertake the project.

Protest was made against payment because, it was alleged, the city fathers were without authority to do anything at all—being in fact, no officers at all.

The court rebuked them rather stingingly. "They (the protesting citizens) were willing that the building be built and the county of Hyde furnish its money for such purpose. Yet they voice objection only when it comes to paying the taxes which had been levied against them."

A Haywood county case, coming up for its second hearing in Supreme court, was of interest chiefly because it shows what big arguments can arise out of public jobs. The controversy is over rights to the position of tax collector for the city of Canton—a post paying \$145 a month. In this, the second appeal, a 14-page opinion was written and even then it seems certain that the matter is left open for further litigation.

Next week's calendar appears to involve no cases of more than passing interest to anyone except the litigants and lawyers who are always alert to the ruling of the supreme court.

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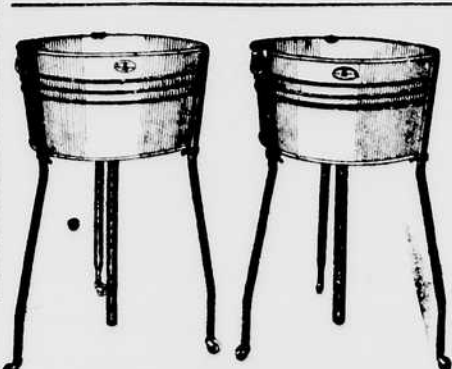
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"Green Hornet Strikes Again"
