Southern Producers Accept Plan

Group Agrees to President Roosevelt's Proposal to Negotiate Two-Year Agreement With Union; Pay Boost Granted.

Washington, April 29.—(AP)—The United Mine Workers' union announced today that it had agreed to a two-year contract with the southern coal producers. The agreement, which was announced by the union's executive board, provides for a 10 percent pay increase and a two-year term. The union also agreed to a new system of arbitration for disputes. The agreement was reached after several weeks of negotiations. The union's president, John L. Lewis, said that the agreement was a significant step towards peace in the coal industry. The southern coal producers, who are represented by the National Coal Producers' Association, also expressed their satisfaction with the agreement. They said that it would help to stabilize the coal market and ensure a steady supply of coal for the war effort.

Speed Boats Stage Fight In Channel

Engagement Between British and German Speed Boats and Heavy Cross Channel Bombardment Interpreted as "Feelers".

(By The Associated Press) A battle between British and German speed boats attacking all night the western "mines" east of England was reported today as most long range guns on the French coast opened the heaviest cross channel bombardment of the war. The twin actions may have been "feeler" shots of the type likely to become general in an invasion attempt. The official German news agency declared several British speed boats were damaged in the clash. Apparently, however, Hitler's long-anticipated storming of the British Isles was not in the immediate offing. It was pointed out in London yesterday that the royal air force had not concentrated recently on bombing German-held ports across the channel. This would indicate that the royal air force had not found any new massing of German troop barges. In the Balkans, Hitler's war machine—undeterred on land—was reported getting an assault on the island of Crete, 75 miles south of the Greek mainland in what might be a full dress rehearsal for an attempt to invade England. The island is the new governmental seat of King George II, who fled Athens last Wednesday. It also serves as a British base and presumably part of the British expeditionary force has landed there in its flight from Greece. The official German news agency asserted that five British ships totaling 18,500 tons were sunk by Nazi dive bombers yesterday in a passage between the Greek mainland and Crete. British guns returned the fire of the German channel batteries. Royal air force bombers dashed across the channel at the height of the shelling and many explosions of the French coast indicated they were pounding the Nazi gun emplacements. In North Africa, Premier Churchill's high command reported German and Italian seafaring troops infiltrated heavily to cross on the British-occupied island of Salamis and invade the Egyptian frontier from Libya. London officials countered with the assertion that the axis vanguard driving toward the Suez canal had been held in check by the increasing action of British patrol five or six miles east of Salamis. NATIONAL DEBT RISE FORESEEN

Commerce Secretary Jones Predicts Nation's Debt Will Mount to Ninety Billion; "Plenty" of Sacrifices in Store.

Washington, April 29.—(AP)—James Jones forecast today that the national debt would mount to at least 90 billion dollars, and declared "there have not yet made any sacrifices." "But they are, in fact, for the sake of them," the secretary of Commerce added in an address before the annual convention of the United States Chamber of Commerce. "A few months ago we were worrying about whether we could afford to increase government borrowing authority above \$45,000,000,000," Jones declared. "It seems probable that it will grow to at least double that amount, even although we are going to do our utmost to keep it as low as possible. It is our duty to do this, and we will do it." "But whatever amount we have to borrow we must contribute to the war effort," he said. "The cabinet officials declared that 'such a rise' would be supported for national defense with the next four years, and pointed out that the cost of maintaining the Army and Navy will amount to the same amount as the war effort. "We are not now beginning to have some idea," he said, "of what all this is going to cost, but only a rough idea because it will cost more than we now think."

Lindbergh's Resignation Accepted

Washington, April 29.—(AP)—The War department announced today that Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh's resignation as a reserve officer in the Army air corps had been accepted. The famous flier had written President Roosevelt he was tendering his resignation because of the President's comment about him at a press conference last Friday that "no honorable alternative" existed. While it has been the War department's policy not to accept resignations from reserve officers during the current war, Secretary Stimson possessed discretionary power to act favorably or unfavorably on them.

Stephen Early Criticizes Lindbergh

Washington, April 29.—(AP)—Stephen Early, presidential secretary, said today that Charles A. Lindbergh's resignation as a reserve officer in the Army air corps "is a matter to be decided by the War department."

Industry Credited With Miracle

Philadelphia, April 29.—(AP)—American industry has performed a modern miracle of defense, declares President Walter Fuller of the National Association of Manufacturers. "Through the voluntary cooperation of free men we have made more progress in ten months than Hitler did in two and one-half years with his much vaunted dictator economy," Fuller said. "Addressing 500 industrialists from the part of the 'arsenal' region last night, the head of the Curtis Publishing Company pointed out that industry had absorbed \$13,000,000,000 in defense orders in less than a year and placed 99 per cent of them in production. "And our February survey shows that 86 per cent of the manufacturers expect to deliver on or before contract delivery dates," he added. "By the end of 1942, Fuller stated, America will be '100 per cent' prepared for the world. "And fortunately so, he continued. "Declarations that there shall be no war and 'no AEF' fade into the distance. Many people are saying that the war is nobody's fault, is upon us.
