Survivors Tell Details Of Sinking

Rio de Janeiro, June 14.—(AP)—Survivors of the U. S. freighter Robin Moor dramatically poured together last night the details of the sinking and of their 18 perilous days at sea in an open boat, drenched by torrential rains, scorched by a scorching sun and in constant fear of death.

Antonio Santos, of Newark, N. J., chief cook of the Robin Moor, one of the 41 picked up by the Brazilian rescue ship, Ozorio, declared that an armed German in the boarding party from the German submarine immediately seized the vessel's radio and prevented the flashing of an SOS.

The 4,999-ton ship, laden with automobiles and general cargo, was stopped by signal lights from the submarine, he said, and 23 minutes later the 46 crewmen and passengers were ordered to the lifeboats, a torpedo attack and shells from the submarine's deck guns sent her to the bottom.

Praises Small Child
 Santos, expressing special admiration for an unnamed, four-year-old youngster in one of the lifeboats, said that all four of the Robin Moor's boats stayed together for several days in the hope of locating a rescue ship.

Three of the boats, with 35 persons, have not yet been reported.

"These 18 days and nights—I'll never forget those awful days and nights—were spent in almost constant rowing," Santos said. "Torrential rains drenched the survivors, but helped replenish their lowering water supply, he said."

Another survivor, William Cary, of Delmar, N. Y., said that one submarine officer seemed especially interested in the Robin Moor's deck cargo of automobiles.

Officer Is "Sorry"
 The same officer, Cary said, told the first officer of the Robin Moor that "we are very sorry but you are carrying cargo bound for a country which is fighting us" and then explained that the submarine would have to sink the ship and its cargo.

When the vessel first was stopped as it pushed through the south Atlantic toward Capetown, Union of S. Africa, Cary said, "A German officer on her tower (of the submarine) asked in bad English, 'what cargo we were carrying and our destination.'"

After the Robin Moor's first officer clearly answered the questions, Cary related, the German officer went below.

Courage Is Shown
 The women, and especially the four-year-old boy, Cary said, were "very courageous" and accepted the order to take to the lifeboats without a whimper or complaint.

"One German sailor, he said, gave his boat a can of pressed black bread but the lifeboat passengers found it too tough to eat."

"On the 10th day of our voyage at 11 a. m. we sighted a ship and lit a signal fire but they did not see us," Cary said, after corroborating the seaman's story of the tortures of the rain and tropical sun.

"During the horrible voyage we sang and joked as much as possible, trying to keep our morale high until the Ozorio found us."

Wheat Sale Rules Given

College Station, Raleigh, June 14.—The following facts are of import to at least 75,000 North Carolina residents—wheat growers, millers, combiners, and threshers:

All wheat threshers and combine operators who take wheat as toll for harvest work are required under the 1941 wheat marketing quota law to make permanent records of the transaction. This record is necessary, it was explained today by E. Y. Floyd, State AAA executive officer at State College, to identify the toll wheat when it is passed along by the chresher or combiner to other buyers.

Millers and processors of wheat also are required to execute a Triple A form listing all wheat bought and including grain accepted as toll for grinding. If the miller maintains his own system of bookkeeping, his system should be modified so as to embrace all information required for the marketing quota program record.

Any person—harvester or processor—who accepts penalty at 49 cents a bushel on excess wheat is required to execute a separate AAA form unless the wheat is identified by the thrasher or combine operator.

Executive Officer Floyd said that all growers who remove 1941 wheat from the farm either as toll or by sale must have a marketing card in order to make such removal without penalty. Marketing cards now are available in county AAA offices and may be issued immediately to growers who have planted 12 acres of wheat or less, and to those growers whose wheat acreage has been checked. Other growers may receive marketing cards as soon as acreage is checked by the AAA.

Defense Program May Take Some 'Lost Colony' Actors

Monte Carlo, June 14.—Though the national defense program may take some of the personnel of Paul Green's "The Lost Colony," which opens its fifth season at East Raleigh here July 3, the company today declared that this year's production promises to be the most brilliant and colorful since the inception of the Roanoke Island Historical Association.

"With our cast of 200, some of our folk may be drafted and we are taking care of every emergency by having experienced actors and technicians ready to step into parts and posts vacated by those answering the nation's call," D. Bradford Fearing, president of the Roanoke Island Historical Association, said. "We have patriotic drama and urge our folks to do their part in the national defense program."

No exceptions are being made, according to Mr. Fearing. One actor to date has been drafted, Sam Hirsch, who plays the roles of Simon Fernald and the Master of the Queen's Ceremonies alternately since the beginning of "The Lost Colony." However, arrangements have been made for two experienced Broadway actors, who have already played important parts in the page-and-drama, to fill these roles.

In the technical staff two posts may have to be filled before the season closes—that of stage manager, which has been held by Gene Langston for three summers, and that of technical manager, held by Wilbur Dorsett since the first year of the drama. In every case, Director Samuel Selden declared that experienced technicians are ready to step into their posts to make for smooth performances.

As for the renamed of the cast of this summer's production of "The Lost Colony," a welcome change is the return of Donald Somers to the comic role of Old Tom which he played during the second and third seasons. Unable to return last summer because of a previous engagement at the New York World's Fair,
