

City Budget Is Down \$4,000, Salary Increases \$2,200

Expenditure Schedules Get Council's Approval

Tentative Adoption Voted but Budget Must Remain on File in Clerk's Office Month for Public Inspection.

Tentative approval was given by the Henderson City Council at a called meeting Tuesday night at the 1941-42 fiscal year budget. The mayor, J. C. Kirtrell, presented the budget for the year beginning July 1, 1941, and comparison with the year 1940-41. The budget shows a decrease of \$4,000 in expenditures and an increase of \$2,200 in salaries.

Members of 4-H boys clubs will compete in judging of seeds and eggs and winners will be awarded prizes provided by local merchants.

Elaborate coronation processions are planned for the afternoon program, when Allen Wilson, county health king, and Alonzo Keeton, county health queen, and Charles Rogers and Jane Frazier, junior health champions, will be crowned. The county king and queen of the 4-H health contests, both being graduated in the district competition, the annual health champions of the county, outside of this county.

Miss Frances MacGregor, state 4-H club leader, will be the principal speaker on the morning program, and she will be introduced by Miss Josephine Ramos Vance, county assistant home demonstration agent. Others to appear on the morning program include Miss Ruth Howie, 4-H club member who will lead the devotionalists; the Rev. T. W. Lee, who will offer prayer; and Miss Julia Mae Henderson, president of the county 4-H club council, who will welcome the guests.

At the afternoon program, in addition to the coronation ceremony, Miss Edna Oliver, Vance county public health nurse, will be a featured speaker. Miss Oliver will be introduced by Mrs. B. M. Newman, home demonstration 4-H club leader. Greetings will be read from Mr. Amosle Avant, district agent, and Miss Ruth Howie, club member, will give a vocal solo.

4-H clubs to be represented at the Federation Day include boys and girls clubs of the Dobbins, Townsville, Middleburg, Dewey, Aycox and Zeb Vance schools.

Walter Bush Dies In Ohio On Visit

Officials of The Corbitt Company, local truck manufacturers, learned today of the sudden death yesterday in Washington Court, Ohio, of Walter Bush, 62, who had been with the company as state sales representative since 1914. Mr. Bush was visiting a sister in Washington Court at the time of his death. He is survived by another sister, Mrs. Annette Bush Coffman, of Aycox, they being the only relatives as he was unmarried.

Mr. Bush lived in Raleigh. Before going there as representative of the Corbitt firm he was salesman for some of the "pioneer" automobile companies.

He was active in the Raleigh Y. M. C. A. and had won several awards for outstanding work during campaigns in The Salvation Army, Jesse Temple and Kiwanis club of Raleigh.

Funeral services were to be held in Washington Court today, but details were not learned.

Mr. Bush left Raleigh two weeks ago and had been to Detroit, Michigan and was on his way back to Henderson when he stopped in Washington Court to visit his sister. He became ill last Sunday, and died Tuesday afternoon about 4:30 o'clock. R. J. Corbitt, head of the company here, left Tuesday for Mr. Bush's bedside and was believed to have arrived in time for the funeral today.

CANDY KITCHEN HAS NEW SODA FOUNTAIN


The Henderson Candy Kitchen has installed a new, modern soda fountain, with a modern drink cooling box to be added within the next few days, John Matinas, owner, said today.
