AGENTS RETURN FROM FARM AND HOME WEEK

J. W. Sanders, Vance county farm agent, and Mrs. H. E. Plummer, home demonstration agent, returned to their offices today after spending a week at State College in Raleigh attending the annual Farm and Home Week.

Defense projects in the area included defense resident centers at Raleigh and Durham, woodworking defense shops at Raleigh and Durham, an auto mechanics shop in Henderson, and two defense construction jobs.

Of the other 37 projects in the area which are classed as regular, Mr. Waters said, two are Negro resident centers, one of which is a center for girls at Henderson Institute and the other is a center for boys at Beakes in Edgecombe county.

Stock Leaders Add Losses

New York, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Taxes and war doubts persisted as anti-bullish arguments in today's stock market and leading industrials added fractions to two points to recent losses.

Negative comfort was derived from the fact that selling never seemed really urgent. Transfers for the two hours were around 350,000 shares.

The direction was downward from the start and few recoveries were in sight at the close. It was the eleventh straight session in which the list, on average, had made no progress. This was one of the longest stalemated in a decade.
