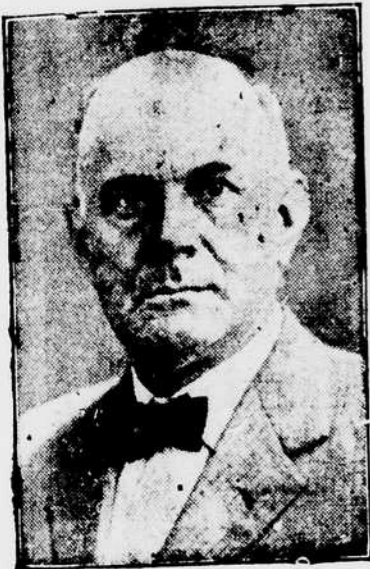
Rose Counts 56 Years In Business

Health Department Is Active In Many Fields

Staff Complete and Functioning Despite Changes; Food Establishments Inspected; Constant War Waged on Tuberculosis.

Last February Harriet M. Champion, sanitary inspector, resigned and went to work with the state department in the new sanitary district

around Jacksonville. Mrs. Champion, our clerk, going with Mr. Champion made vacant the position of clerk in the health office. These positions were filled in March by W. Hall Brooks of Roxboro, a recent graduate of the School of Public Health at Chapel Hill, as sanitarian and Mrs. Bennett Taylor Wilson as clerk. Mrs. Wilson has lived most of her life in Henderson and has had much experience as secretary for a hospital and private doctors. Also, the colored nurse, while of the same name as Rosa Lee Brown, is a different nurse, than a year ago, as the first nurse Brown, has gone to Richmond to take special studies in public health work.

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Dispatch To Carry News Of Markets

Daily Reports on Tobacco and on Cotton As Statistics Are Available; Paper Also Gives High Spots of Outside News.

As has been its custom for many years, the Daily Dispatch will carry daily reports on sales and prices on the Henderson tobacco market during the coming season. It will also print figures about cotton sales in this city from time to time as they are available.

Tobacco reports are to be furnished from the office of Smith H. Young, sales supervisor of the market. Mr. Young is now in his second year as supervisor, and is more familiar with and better equipped than ever before to give the facts about activities on a wholesale floor here.

Better prices for both tobacco and cotton this year will be of interest to growers and to the general public alike. While the crop are not large, by comparison with some other seasons, sales are expected to be rather rapid, at least until Thanksgiving for tobacco and even later for cotton, as much of that crop will not be picked before mid-autumn or later.

In addition to news from the local markets, the Dispatch will be served daily, as it has for twenty-six years, by The Associated Press about rapidly moving events in the world at large. So far as transportation is concerned, either for passengers or for farm crops, the horse and buggy days are past. Modern methods are available to farmers who will bring their tobacco to market this year as for many years.

Good condition of all the highways, a number of them of recent construction, afford ideal routes for growers to reach their marketing objectives in Henderson. Steep grades and muddy roads are but a memory in this section, as they are in many parts of North Carolina. So that trucks hauling large quantities of tobacco and cotton have no difficulty in moving at reasonable speed to Henderson to bring the year's production of the farm for sale for the high dollar.
