Cotton Prices Are Higher

Farm Prices and Labor Rates May React Disastrously When War Boom Ends, Babson Says

New York, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Cotton futures opened 13 to 20 higher.

When 500 farm representatives demand more representation in government and less interference with farm prices, while food prices are increasing every week, things are going to be bad. This is especially true when the government "interference" both in the case of wage-workers and farmers, has been to raise both the wages and farm prices above what they would naturally be if allowed to follow their own course.

Government Interference

The government is guilty of raising food prices in at least three ways: (1) It has been buying food and shipping it out of the country at the rate of \$2,000,000 per day—covering 70 different products—thus increasing demand. (2) It has pegged the price of nine food products at relatively higher levels by announcing that it will buy all of them offered. (3) It jacked up wheat and corn prices by the policy, forced on the administration by the farm bloc, of

accepting these crops as collateral for loans at prices equal to 85 per cent of "parity."

The cost of living is less today than in 1929. Living costs have increased less than 5 per cent even during the past year. This increase, moreover, has been wholly due to union wages and pegged food prices—both of which have been artificially raised. I would not complain that such are at their highest prices in twelve years if they were "natural prices."

Wage Workers vs. Farmers. Wage workers should keep in mind that higher wages mean higher prices; farmers' should remember that as they raise their prices, they must pay more for all they buy.

There is wrong for the labor leaders to fool the workman—and wrong for the politicians to fool the farmers as they are now doing. Passing laws will not make two plus two equal five; nor make water run uphill. The correct solution for our economic parity. The whole parity program is "cockeyed" when food grain and hay supplies for 1941-42 will be far above average. This will be more hogs, cattle and poultry mouths to feed, but feed available per mouth will be up the 1923-32 average.

No maximum prices for food have as yet been set, except on imported products such as pepper, coffee, raw sugar, salmon and certain canned goods. The government, however, has established—an unheard of and crazy thing—minimum wholesale prices for hogs, dairy products, chickens, eggs, tomatoes, peas, apricots, raisins and prunes. In addition, the government itself has bought, through the surplus marketing administration, over 265 million pounds of pork products, 175 million pounds of lard, 55 million pounds of cheese, 4 million cases of tomatoes, 9 million pounds of soybeans, 9 million pounds of vitamin concentrates, 1 million cases of grapefruit, 2,500,000 bushels of corn, and 64 million pounds of dried and frozen eggs.

What of the Future? Those of us who have worked on a farm want the farmers to be better off. Farmers deserve better conditions, but they should realize that the politicians are now "taking them for a ride," yes, and a ride toward a real precipice. Some day these artificial farm aids, crop loans, price pegging, etc., must come to an end. Lapse of farm prices. Far better for

submarine attack, which has been going on for several days in an unspecified zone of the North Atlantic but the high command and other commentators said scattered vessels still are being chased. Late dispatches disclosed the convoy was intercepted on its way from North America to England. The spokesman, who gave Germany's first official reaction to President Roosevelt's order to fire on German and Italian ships at sight, declined to comment on possible future action. "What happens now?" he was asked. "Not Mr. Roosevelt, but we will determine that," he retorted. The spokesman took up point by point the President's allegation of German designs against American shipping. Concerning the U. S. destroyer Greer, he reiterated that the German submarine fired only after the Greer had dropped depth bombs. The President's statement that a submarine had followed a United States battleship last July he called a pure invention. The merchant ship Robin Moor was sunk in the Southern Atlantic in accordance with the usages of international law, the spokesman said, claiming she was carrying contraband. If the merchantman Steel Seafarer was among the ships sunk by German planes, he contended, she was in a war zone declared by both Germany and Italy and was loaded with war materials for Britain in the near past. Concerning the sinking of the S. S. Sessa off Iceland by a submarine, he said the vessel was under the flag

Presents Ideal Diet List For Expectant Mothers

BY LOGAN CLENDENING, M. D. One of my obstetrical friends feels that prospective mothers have a good deal of intelligence, enough to run their own diets. He does not approve of the custom which is becoming prevalent of giving expectant mothers courses of vitamins and charging extra sums for this. (He might make an exception in the case of Vitamin K which is used to prevent the hemorrhage of the new-born.) His plan is to ask the woman to plan her own diet after a little study of what a balanced diet should be. He instructs her to be sure to get the protective foods, particularly milk and green vegetables and fruits, in the diet. Then he asks her to make a list of a diet that she eats for a week and this is brought in to him for supervision. Gives Sample Diet List. He has kindly furnished me with a sample diet list that was made up and brought in by an expectant mother in the routine course of seeing such patients. He and I both agree that it could not be improved on by the best dietitian in the world. For the benefit of others, here it is: Monday: breakfast; grapefruit, cereal flakes, toast, marmalade, milk. Lunch; milk. Supper; french toast, bacon, egg, milk. Tuesday: breakfast; grapefruit, cereal flakes, toast, marmalade, milk. Lunch; milk. Supper; roast veal, carrots, lettuce salad, celery, bread, rhubarb sauce, cake, milk. Wednesday: breakfast; orange, dry cereal, toast, jam, milk. Lunch; spinach, beets, beans, cottage cheese, rye bread, milk. Supper; creamed veal, peas, carrots, bread, jam, banana salad, tea, cake, milk. Thursday: breakfast; orange, cereal flakes, toast, jam, milk, sweet roll. Lunch; deviled egg, sandwich, lettuce, cookie, milk. Supper; lamb chop, cauliflower, lettuce salad, pineapple, milk. Friday: breakfast; grapefruit, cereal flakes, toast, jam, milk. Lunch; milk. Supper; chicken legs, creamed peas, potatoes, carrots, celery, radishes, fruit Jello salad, coconut cake, milk.
