Many New Biographies Received At Library

To the many thoughtful readers who prefer true stories to fiction, the group of life stories and personal narratives just received at the library will be of interest. "Using the Double," narrates the experience of Virginia Cowles, a young American woman — newspaper correspondent during the past five years saw with broad to cover the war in Spain, was on the spot during the 1935 Prague in Czechoslovakia and in Prague before and after Munich. "A Different Book," Carl Sandburg says of it, "Of Will Percy, I might be said that he is to the state of Mississippi what William Allen White is to Kansas, what Eugene LaGuardia is to Manhattan, and his life story identical with his locale and region. The deep South, the old South, a new South, several Souths, move across Percy's autobiography."

"Raleigh and his World," by Irvin Shipley, is not only a biography of Raleigh but also a brilliant picture of the splendid Tudor and Stuart reigns in which Sir Walter rose, flourished, and fulfilled his tragic destiny.

"Aid Biography," by A. A. Milne is the life story of the English author, who has written many essays, plays, and novels, but who is best known for his children's books "When We Were Very Young," "Winnie-the-Pooh," and others written originally of his small son Christopher Robin.

"No Lady for a Lady," is the story of Agnes Morley Cleveland, whose family moved to a ranch in the wild west part of New Mexico when she was eleven. The author built a grizzled, and became a cow-puncher, when she wasn't away at school. She and three friends were said to be the best riders in Catron county. She played poker all night with two rustlers who came to steal

her horses and went away the next morning having taken nothing but a hat. It was no life for a lady but she thrived on it.

"Whistler's Mother" tells the story of the woman whose portrait by her artist son James McNeill Whistler made her world famous. She was born in the South and lived for a time in North Carolina. Her husband was a rail road builder and took his family with him all over the world — to Boston and New York, to Russia, France and England. She had the happy faculty of making a home wherever the family stopped.

"In Search of Soviet Gold," is the record of an American engineer who tells what he saw and did during ten years of gold mining for Stalin.

"Hitler's Twelve Apostles," by Oswald Ditch, is the story of the seven closest to the German dictator. In tracing their histories and evaluating their character and talents the author adds a new chapter to the history of National Socialism.

"Letters to Mary," by Catherine Hayes Brown, is the autobiography of Helen Hayes, the well known American actress, written by her mother.

Far Heel Farmers Butcher Much Pork

College Station, Raleigh, Sept. 12.—North Carolinians eat more of the pork they raise than do the people of any other state in the union except Texas, it was announced today by Ellis V. V. Stal, swine specialist of the N. C. State college extension service.

On the basis of 1939 figures released by the U. S. Bureau of Census, Specialist Vostal said that North Carolina farmers that year butchered for home use a total of 857,099 hogs and pigs. That total is an average of four hogs to the farm on the 219,407 farms reporting.

The Texas total in 1939 was 869,140 animals, based on 231,315 farms. The third ranking state was Georgia with 779,194 hogs killed on 170,818 farms, the census figures showed.

The Middle Atlantic states as a unit were listed sixth among the nine geographical divisions of the nation in hogs grown for home use.
