### Far Heel Farmers Butcher Much Pork

College Station, Raleigh, Sept. 12.—North Carolinians eat more of the pork they raise than do the people of any other state in the union except Texas, it was announced today by Ellis V. Vestal, swine specialist of the N. C. State college extension service. On the basis of 1939 figures released by the U. S. Bureau of Census, Specialist Vestal said that North Carolina farmers that year butchered for home use a total of 857,099 hogs and pigs. That total is an average of four hogs to the farm on the 219,407 farms reporting. The Texas total in 1939 was 869,140 animals, based on 231,315 farms. The third ranking state was Georgia with 779,194 hogs killed on 170,818 farms, the census figures showed. The Middle Atlantic states as a unit were listed sixth among the nine geographical divisions of the nation in hogs grown for home use.
