## Nazi Forces Renewed Activity Suffer High On North African Casualties

More Than Ten Thousand Germans Killed and Wounded, Vast **Ouantities** of Arms and Ammunition Seized, Russians Claim.

Moscow, Sept. 17.-(AP)-The Red army, in a smashing counter attack only 30 miles northeast of Smolensk, has thrown German forces back westward in an eight-day battle in which more than 10.000 Germans were killed and wounded. Russian dispatches from the front said today.

The battle occurred in the direc-tion of Yart evo, which is on the main highway between Smolensk and Moscow. Vast quantities of arms ind ammunition were seized, according to the army newspaper, Rec Star.

Another dispatch reported the recapture by Leningrad's army defenders of a strategically important crossroads village lying on one of the approaches to the city-a maneuver declared by the Russians to have wrecked German plans for a new thrust against Leningrad itself.

### **Explosions** In Harbor Are Mystery

Full Extent of Disaster Unknown, As Flaming Oil Hampers Rescue; All Three **Vessels** Comparatively New Swedish-Built.

Stockholm, Sept. 17.-(AP)--Three Swedish destroyers blew up mysteriously and sank today while at anchor in an east coast Swedish port and first reports said at least 31 men were killed. Casualties were feared to be high, but the full extent of the disaster was not known because of flaming oil hampering desperate rescue efforts.

It was established, however, that one officer, six non-commissi ned of-ficers and 24 marines were killed, elides eleven others injured in the xplosion.

Swedish authorities said could not account for the blast which apparently, started on one ship and ank all three, one after the other.

The explosions occurred in Haarfsjaerden harbor, a fjord on the Baltic seacoast south of Stockholm used by Sweden's rapidly expanding navy as a proving ground.

All three destroyers were relatively new and Swedish-built.

The 1.040-ton Goteborg, completed 1936, was said to have blown up nd sunk first. Explosions foll wed
