

have not acquired our notions about foreign integrations in South American republics without basis, Incidents have been sufficient to justify at least some suspicions. Granting that our ideas may result from our own ignorance of true conditions, there has been enough to ar use speculation. If we have been misted, it will be good news to know that we have.

An encouraging angle, too, has been that thus far every reported attempt of Nazis to gain a foothold in South America has been frustrated. We have taken fright from knowledge of large German settlements in various republics to the south, but to this they answer, says the professor, that there are more Germans in the United States than in South America, and they have not gained control of anything here and no serious fears are held that they may do it. All of which is plausible argument.

What lies behind that, though, is the feeling that South Americans are not firmly enough rooted in their own loyalties to resist as North Americans are.

The professor's conclusions a may be accepted in good faith or with several grains of salt. At least it is a different slant from what we have been receiving from down bething of a value on the cheerful side of the ledger.
