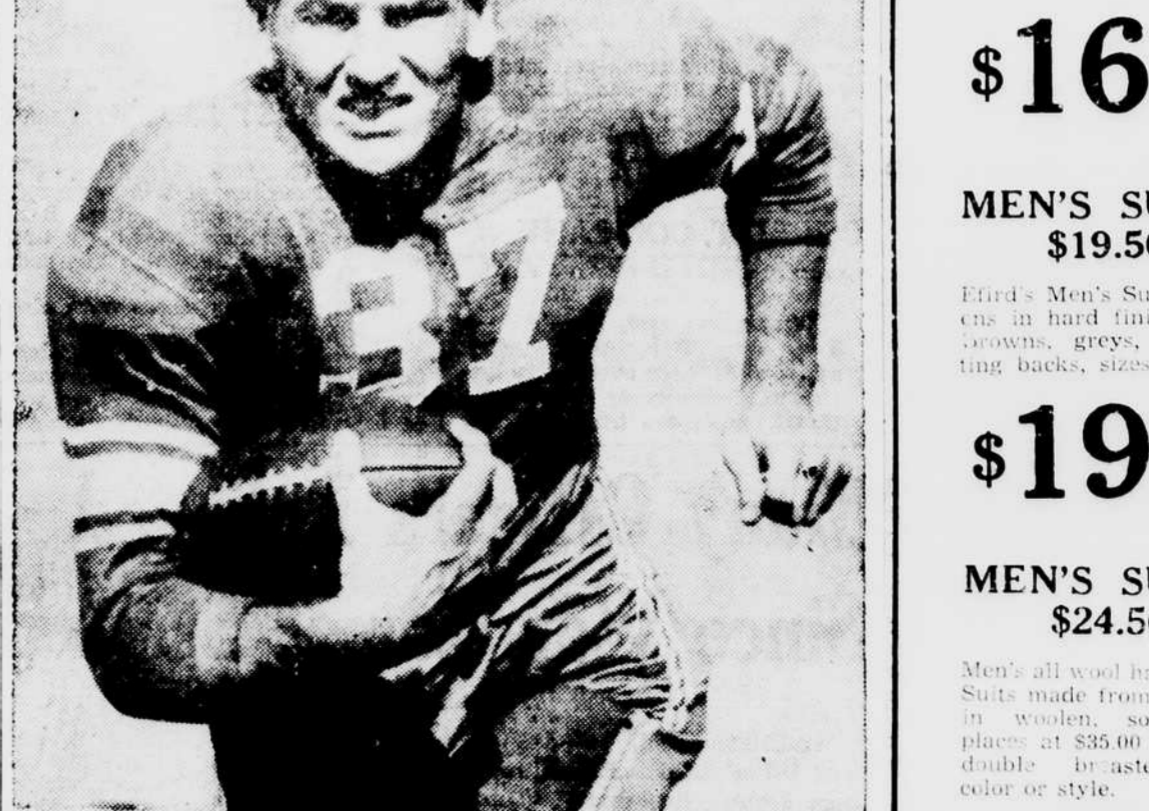

on the report that German siege guns were now in a position to shell Moscow's outer perimeter of defenses. Normally, field guns have a range of 25 miles, but German "big boys" are said to have a range of more than 75 miles.

The Russians, reporting a vast slaughter of the invaders, admitted the fall of strategic Vyazma, 125 miles west of Moscow, but declared the German offensive was stalling before growing Red army resistance in that sector.

Special front-line dispatches pictured a series of gigantic mechanized battles ranging over the fields west of Moscow, with the German fighting tanks and motorized infantry from one sector to another in an effort to find soft spots.
