

Pitt To Be In Top Form For Duke U.

Pittsburgh, Oct. 22.—Barring mishaps on the practice field this week, the Pitt Panthers are going to move into the game with Duke at the Pitt stadium this Saturday in the best physical condition that they have been in this season.

The Panthers came out of the Minnesota game without a casualty. There were a few bumps and bruises but the entire team that started against the Gophers is ready for the Blue Devils this week.

There are not likely to be any lineup changes this Saturday, the combination that faced the opening kickoff against Minnesota, apparently being the best that has been brought together thus far.

The Pitt coaching staff, while it has many things to correct in the play of the Panthers, felt encouraged over the success of the running game, which functioned better than at any time this year.

Better coverage of punts and kick-offs, better blocking and better defensive play by the secondary are practice objectives for the week.

Duke comes up with the best offensive outfit in the Southern Conference, perhaps as good as that shown by Minnesota in the latter stages of their recent football game. Duke's offense, which has been the fastest man playing football today, and to the Panthers, with memories of Minnesota's Hagen still fresh in their memories this will be bad news.

Storer is only part of a great backfield that includes Leo Lamm, one of the finest sophomores in the country. Steve Lach, whose pass receiving hurt and hurt last fall, and who can do as many things well as any halfback Pitt has faced yet, or will face, and Tommy Prothro, 210 pound blocking back.

The Blue Devils, undefeated in four starts against Wake Forest, Tennessee, Maryland, and Colgate, are due in Pittsburgh Friday morning.

Raleigh, Oct. 22.—A big week-end is on tap for Wake Forest Friday, Saturday, and Sunday of this week. Headliner of the activities will be the football game between the Deacons and the University of North Carolina, Saturday afternoon, starting at 2 o'clock.

Without doubt the gridiron encounter, which is billed as the homecoming event, will stand head and shoulders above other attractions of the week's program, but the fraternities and other organizations on the campus have laid plans to royally entertain the returning alumni and friends, before and after the game.

To lend color to the festivities, local townships are offering prizes to the fraternities with the most attractive home decorations, and the different houses will find themselves bedecked with gay colors and designs representing the University of North Carolina and Wake Forest.

The Wake-up will really get underway Friday afternoon when the Deacons footballers play host to the North Carolina Fresh eleven here in Grove Stadium. Starting time for this contest will be three o'clock.

And following the freshman game at 9 Friday night, a huge pep meeting which will probably surpass any ever staged here in color and spirit will take place in the local gymnasium. Wake's Radio Station of Raleigh is planning to air the pep rally from 9:00 to 9:30. Members of the faculty, student body, the captains of the football team, John Polanski and Carl Gayler, coaches, and town people are included in the program to go over the air.

Visitors from the neighboring towns are cordially invited to be on hand throughout the entire proceedings, whether they be alumni or not.

Advance ticket sales took a sharp increase with the Tuesday morning and indications now point to a capacity crowd for the ball game Saturday.

State Big Favorite Saturday

Raleigh, Oct. 22.—North Carolina State is the overwhelming favorite against Newberry when it meets the Indians in Riddick stadium Saturday night, but the Wolfpack expects to get a lot more than a good workout against the South Carolinians.

Billy Laval is the coach of the Newberry club and he will bring to Raleigh one of the finest small college teams in the country. The Indians hold a weight advantage over State with their two starting tackles being the largest the Wolfpack will face this season.

Newberry is a typical Laval-coached team with a flashy, deceptive attack which will keep the State defense on the alert. Laval is a pioneer in hidden ball tactics and his Indians are adept at carrying out the "House of Magic" style.

State also hopes to show an offense which will check better than it has so far this season. Coach Doc Newton has indicated that the usual starting backfield, which is composed of tested seniors, will have to show considerable improvement if it is to get the first string call ahead of the sophomores and reserves.

Everyone is praising the State team for holding back the Wake Forest Deacons with a lone touchdown, but it has been obvious that some changes in the offense are needed. Emphasis on attack will feature most of the practice sessions in the next few weeks.

Thousands of high school seniors from all parts of the State will be on the campus Saturday and will be admitted to the game as guests of the college. The kickoff is scheduled for 1 o'clock.

DEER HUNTS SET FOR HOLLY SHELTER AREA

Raleigh, Oct. 22.—A series of deer hunts will be held in the Holly Shelter Wildlife Area in Pender county during a two-weeks period beginning December 2, Hinton James, North Carolina commissioner of game and inland fisheries, to whom applications should be directed, announced.

Holly Shelter is a 50,000-acre State owned tract, on which game has been protected over a period of about ten years, no hunting having been permitted during that period. Because of the former inaccessibility of the area, game officials pointed out, some of the area has probably never been penetrated by hunters. A Pittman-Robertson federal project of development is being carried out there.

Hunts are scheduled on December 2, 4, 6, 9, 11, and 13, starting at 6 a. m. Reservations will be made for a maximum of 600 hunters for the six days with a limit of 100 hunters daily. No applications will be honored which are not postmarked on or prior to November 15.

Big Ed Michaels and rugged Dick Sieck (above) will hold down the tackle berths when Carolina invades Wake Forest Saturday, and are slated for two of the top line deals with Pat Preston and either Buck Jones or Tony Rubino. Preston and Rubino stepped into starting berths against the Tar Heels last year while still sophomores, but newcomer Jones has been going so great, he has been moved to oust the latter from his post. Sieck is also a regular from last year. Michaels started the season as his first understudy, but the big fellow forged ahead of the other tackles, and Coach Ray Wolf had to make room for him in the starting lineup. The Deacon tackles range from 200 to 210, while Sieck scales 187 and Michaels 219.

Roosevelt Optimistic

Washington, Oct. 22.—(AP) President Roosevelt expressed optimism about the chances in the war with Germany.

Asked about the situation at a press conference yesterday, he said W. Averell Harriman had covered the ground pretty well. Harriman, who headed the American mission to Moscow, said after a talk with the Chief Executive at Hyde Park that he had "great confidence" in the Russian situation.

Harriman had another conference yesterday with Mr. Roosevelt and later reaffirmed his faith that the Russian Government and people would fight on.

"Since my return I have been very much gratified and satisfied at the aggressive steps that have been taken by the American Government in seeing that Russian requirements are being shipped," he told reporters, "they are going forward in large quantities."

Harriman said he and other members of the mission had been able to promise delivery of all the materials Joseph Stalin asked for and "you can judge for yourselves that Stalin's satisfaction was complete."

The Russian Premier Harriman found to be "a human sort of a fellow to deal with, with a keen sense of humor which he allows to play even in serious conversation."

JORDAN, COX LEAD UNC BALL CARRIERS

Sophomores Ray Jordan and Hush (Shot) Cox are the ground gaining leaders on the North Carolina squad which meets Wake Forest in an important Big Five and Conference scrap at Wake Forest Saturday.
