"Before the Printing Press" was the topic for the program of the Tuesday club, when it met Tuesday afternoon in the home of Mrs. J. C. Cooper. The unusual quotation from Howell, "Goose (pen), bee (wax), and e (parliament) govern the world", was used in connection with the subject.

Mrs. S. T. Peace gave a very informative talk on illuminated manuscripts, telling of the beauty and artistry of the illuminations, done chiefly by monks before the time of the printing press. Red, gold and blue were the chief colors of these works, which were usually the opening letter of the paragraph, but sometimes there were whole pictures.

Mrs. Henry Perry credited the Chinese with originating printing cards, in her discussion, "The Origin of Printing Cards". She explained that they were printed before books.

and they were called "sheets dice". She gave the meaning of the symbols of the cards.

Wood blocks were the first step in the art of printing, according to Mrs. J. T. Alderman, who spoke on the subject. She told how the letters were left in relief, and the block was pressed into ink, thereby describing the name "press" for the later machine.

## Youth Crashes Windsor Party

New York, Oct. 22.—(AP)—A good-looking, Viennese youth was taken into police custody today when he "crashed" the 29th floor of the Waldorf Astoria Hotel where he ate at the Duke and Duchess Windsor is located.

Police identified him as Fritz O. Gohardt, 34, a husband of North Park, N. Y., son of a naturalized Viennese employed in Bethlehem, Pa.

There were reports that he got into a bedroom with the young girl, Detective Joseph McFarley, and he dropped her outside an elevator on the floor.

Detectives said Gohardt told them he wanted to see the Duke's personal press representative to arrange for an interview with the couple for a newspaper which he said his mother published in Vienna. He came here two and a half years ago.

They said he got up to the 29th in an elevator, paid a woman detective's money after the Windsor had returned to their suite. Gohardt denied they said that he was admitted to the reception through the porter.

Detectives said Gohardt was carrying his equipment, a photograph, several pieces of writing paper on which he had written notes, and a check of 100 dollars, but only life and limb American Food Committee after this.
