



Mayor Names Committee To Draw Zoning Program

First Meeting To Be Next Week; Half of Eight Members Are From City Council, Half Residents of Four City Wards.

Mayor Henry Powell announced today the entire personnel of the committee which will make study of a zoning system for Henderson, and said the initial meeting of the group would be called some time next week.

The City Council last Monday took authorized appointment of the committee after a petition had been received bearing names of 412 citizens requesting that the city be zoned, taking off residential, business and manufacturing sections and such other divisions as might be found advisable or necessary for operation of the plan. It was agreed that one member of the Council from each of the four wards and one citizen from each of those wards be named to the committee, which will make recommendations to the Council for adoption.

The citizens committee announced today by the mayor included S. J. Jones, Jr., from the first ward; Henry A. Dennis from the second; J. P. Zelazowski from the third; and R. C. Gandy from the fourth.

Aldermen, chosen by the mayor last Monday, include T. F. Crafts from the first ward; B. H. Hicks from the second; T. W. Ellis from the third; and the mayor from his own ward, the fourth.

Plans of action will be furnished to all members of the committee.

Tobacco Sale Average 32.13

Tobacco sales on the Henderson market on Wednesday amounted to 227,926 pounds for \$73,224.58, or an average of \$32.13 per hundredweight, or the equivalent of one cent per pound higher than Tuesday's price.

This morning's season totals to more than 15,400,000 pounds, for approximately \$1,125,000, and an average of \$32.50 per hundredweight.

Farm Meetings To End Friday

Meetings at three colored schools in the county tomorrow night will conclude the series of educational sessions which have been conducted this week under sponsorship of the Vance Agriculture Workers Council. A meeting originally scheduled to be held tomorrow night at the Townsley high school was cancelled because of conflict with a Holloway party planned by the school.

The meetings have been held for the purpose of explaining to farmers the part which agriculture is expected to play in the national defense effort, and to outline goals of increased food and feed production which have been accepted for this county.
