CURTAILMENT INDEFINITLY POSTPONED

The following is an excerpt from a telegram received Thursday night. November 6th from OPM's Donald M. Nelson in Washington:

> "Pursuant to paragraph B (1) of Office of Production Management Limitation Order L-16 you are hereby notified that the date for applying the percentage limitation of the order, so far as it affects your customers, has been indefinitely postponed. This telegram is your authority and direction to notify all consumers affected by Paragraph B (1) of this postponement."

Large Commercial and Industrial customers of our company, such as manufacturing plants, textile mills, hotels, office buildings, large stores and others using 10,000 kilowatt hours of electricity or more per month, who have received by mail specific instructions for procedure under the original order (L-16) are requested to disregard such instructions and continue operations on normal schedules.

BLACKOUT PROVISIONS OF ORDER REMAIN IN EFFECT

Again we quote from Mr. Nelson's telegram:

"This postponement in no way af fects the blackout provisions of the order which remain in full force and effect."

The "blackout" provisions do NOT require a restricted use of electric service for all purposes—it refers only to specific non-essential services listed below. No limitations have been placed upon the use of electricity for other purposes.

THE FOLLOWING USES OF LIGHT ARE STILL PROHIBITED

- 1. Sign Lighting
- 3. Outline Lighting, Flood Lighting or Field lighting for Amusements or Sports.
- 2. Show Window Lighting
- 4. Interior or Exterior Lighting for Decorative or Advertising Purposes

OPM Limitation Order L-16 imposes penalties for continued use of prohibited services.
