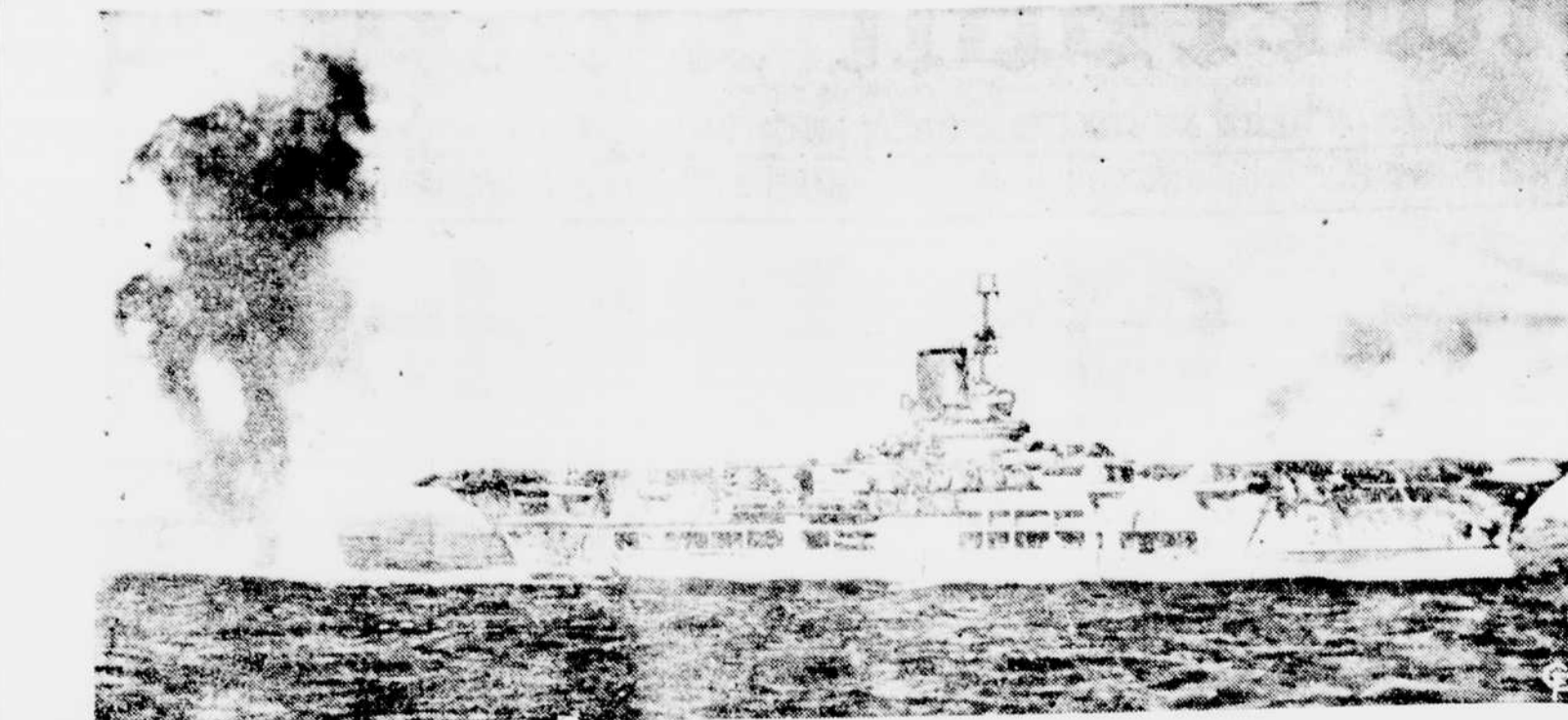

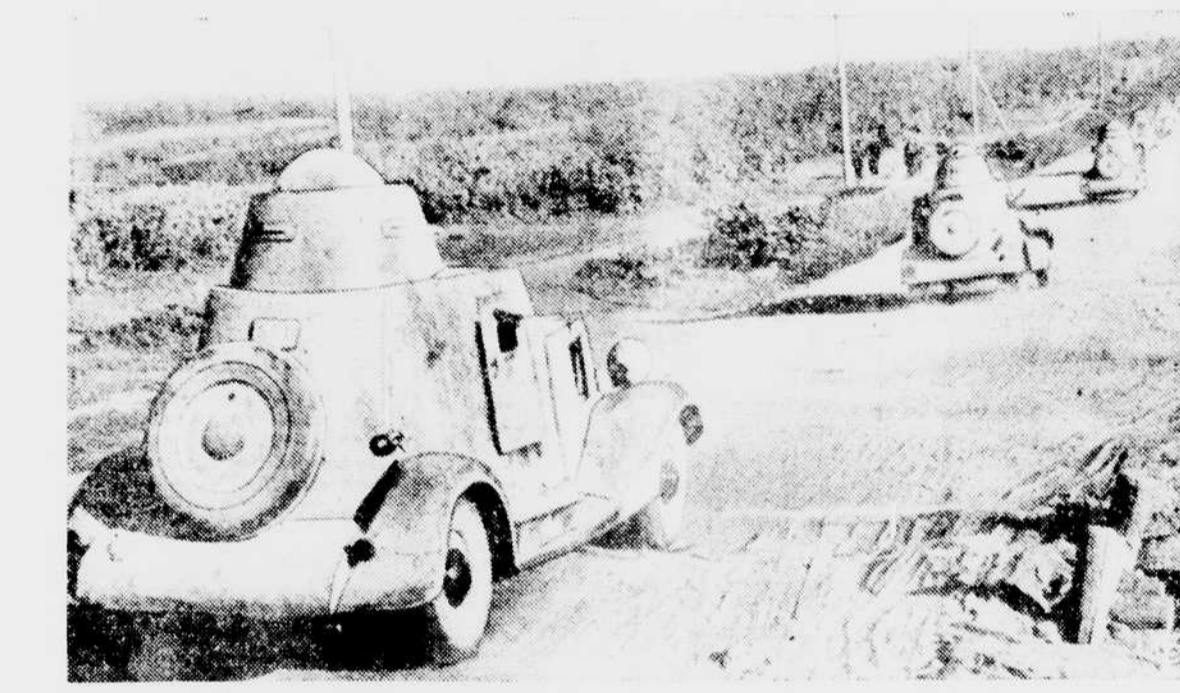

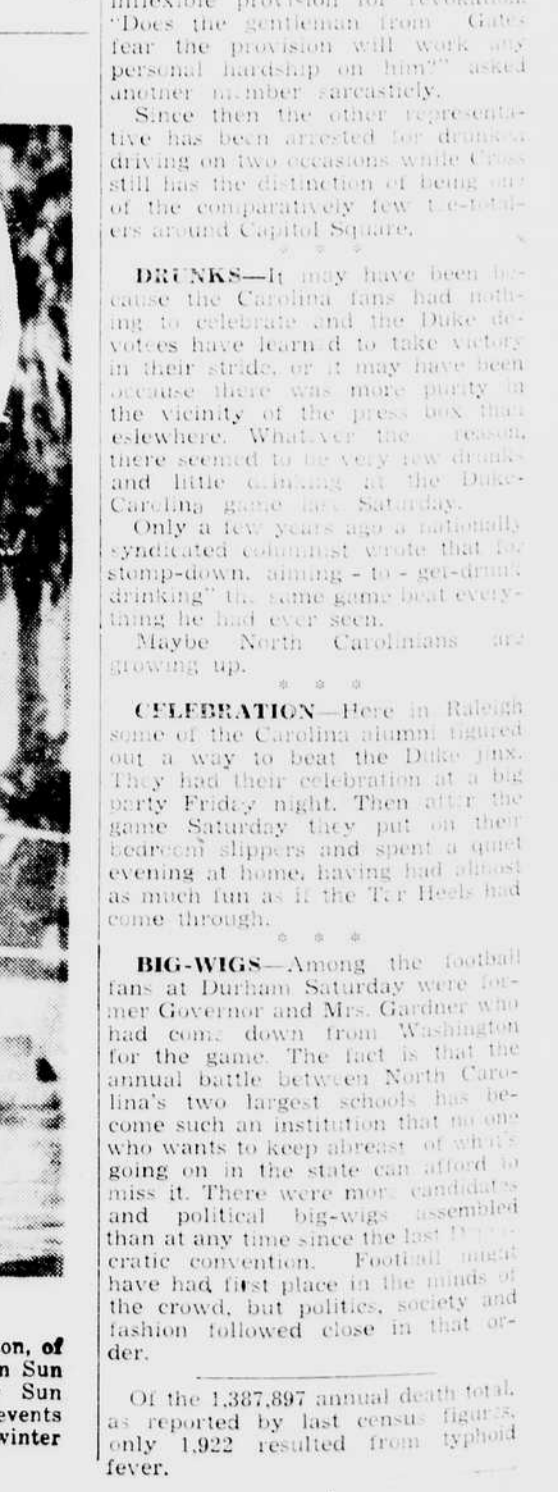
Stock Trend Inconclusive
