### Duke's Power Shown By Statistics

Durham, Nov. 26—Duke's Blue Devils of football, who wound up an undefeated season with their win over N. C. State last Saturday, proved themselves a most powerful offensive even in Duke history, according to the compiled statistics against their nine foes of the past campaign.

The young team smashed all past Duke scoring marks by tallying 311 points—a total that put them at the top of the nation's season heads-up to the final game.

In attacking their unblemished record, the Blue Devils gained a total of 3,333 yards—2,319 yards by rushing and 1,014 by passing. The Duke eleven averaged a net of 370.5 yards per game. Against this figure, nine opponents gained a total of 1,412 yards—841 yards of which were by rushing and 571 yards through passes.

Other figures for the season show that the Blue Devils made 147 first downs, to 75 for their opponents, completed 61 of 181 passes while their foe were connecting with 56 of 124 for a net and only 7 of their series intercepted against 16 which the opposition lost.

In the kicking department the Duke center after a slow start in early games, ended up the campaign with a 43-yard average as against 33.9 yards for the opposition.

The only department of play in which the opposition topped Duke was in punting yards. The Blue Devils led in punting with 1,047 yards, an average of 43.9 yards per punting, as against 1,149 yards for the Blue team.

Chief honors in individual statistics went to Steve Lach, Duke's All-American quarterback, who topped his teammates in every department where he handled the ball. He earned 51 times, gained 408 yards for an average of eight yards rushing, caught 22 passes for 360 yards to top the pass receivers; and kicked 24 times for an average of 43.9 yards to be the team's leading punter.

Other leading figures for individual rushing include those of B. Boy Rife who carried 30 times for 210 yards, an average of seven yards per carry; Tom Davis who carried 96 times for 489 yards, an average of 5.0 yards; Leo Long who carried 60 times for 326 yards, an average of 5.4 yards; and Winston Sutherland who carried 122 times for 541 yards, an average of 4.4 yards per try.

Tom Davis topped the Blue Devil passers with 35 completions out of 66 tosses. Merrill Stager who completed 19 of 47 passes and Rife who completed 12 of 47 passes were also named. Behind Lach, the most effective receivers were Boy Rife who caught 14 and James L. Lister who snatched nine.

Stager topped all centers with 13 touch-downs, and Leo Long topped for a total of 60 yards while Rife led the extra point men by converting 16 of 20 tries.

### Don't Forget, Turn Dunkle, Cox Lead Carolina

Chapel Hill, Nov. 26.—Although the team and individual football performances at the University of North Carolina were below the level of the previous year, there were nevertheless some impressive individual work in the game.

Alexander Harry Dunkle, veteran blocking back, wound up another outstanding punting and placekicking performance for the third consecutive year. Although the final figure of the American Football Statistical Bureau haven't been released, Dunkle's excellent 47.7-yard average for 69 punts is virtually certain to give him a place among the nation's best punners. He is also likely to be near the top in placekicking with his fine record of 14 conversions against only two misses.

Dunkle's impressive record in punting and placekicking is also particularly notable. During his three seasons at Carolina he has punned 174 times for a brilliant average of 42.2 yards. As for his placekicking he has made good 40 times against eight misses for a percentage conversion of 83.3.

Hugh (Sam) Cox, speedy 173-pound sophomore quarterback, was the Tar Heels' No. 1 performer on offense. Cox had the most number of rushes, 113, and gained 371 yards for a 3.3 average. He led the passers with a percentage completion mark of 49.9. Cox made good 29 of 59 passes for 257 yards and three of the aerials resulted directly in touchdowns.

Cox also enjoyed first honors in two other departments. He topped the scorers with four touchdowns for 24 points and was also first in punting yards with 1,047 yards. In punting, he had a 43.9 yard average. He led the passers with a percentage completion mark of 49.9. Cox made good 29 of 59 passes for 257 yards and three of the aerials resulted directly in touchdowns.

From a team standpoint Carolina had an average rushing gain of 37.0 yards per try. The Blue Devils had 1,047 yards for 210 carries for an average of 4.9 yards per try.

Noted for his brilliant passing attack in recent years, Carolina dropped considerably in this department. The Tar Heels made good 44 of 137 passes for a percentage completion of only 32.1.
