

New York, Dec. 9, -(AP) -New York experienced its first air raid alarm today. The all clear signal was heard 29 minutes later at 1:45 p. m. EST.

New York city, the metropoli-tan area and Long Island had braced for a possible air attack after the alarm was sounded at 1:25 p. m. EST. All school children were sent home.

New York. Dec. 9 .--- (AP)---A second air raid alarm was sounded in New York city at 2:05 today just 15 minutes after the all clear signal had been flashed by the police department after a previous alarm at 1:25 p. m. EST, prompted by uncon-firmed reports of hostile planes off the east coast.

New York at noon, all planes at Mitchell Field took to the air and mines were evacuated from the ilitary reservation, although air orps detectors had not confirmed he presence of planes.

Navy press officers said they had not received a report on any hostile planes. They rushed the news to the office of Admiral Adolphus Andrews, commandant of the third naval dis-trict and commander of the north Atlantic coastal frontier which extends rom Hatteras to Halifax.


