Rotary Club Takes Four, Club and Class One Each; Others May All Disappear by Tomorrow; Were 31 in All.

Additional Christmas Opportunities were provided for today, leaving only five yet to be taken until the entire list of thirty-one originally offered half have been assigned a happier Christmas as the result of local generosity. Captain Graham Atter, of The Salvation Army, announced today that the Henderson Rotary club had taken four cases, the Junior Tuesday club one and the Union Philathetic class of the Congregational Christian church one.

It was expected today were that most of the remaining five would be provided for by tomorrow. Captain Mill has had urgent requests for other needy families, and will probably furnish a supplementary list within the next day or two. Progress Made In Preparation For Fighting Incendiary Fire

Raleigh, Dec. 17.—Probably more progress has been made in preparing for incendiary fires than in any other phase of North Carolina civilian defense. The reason is that State Fire Marshal Sherwood Brockwell got started on it immediately after the tragic English evacuation at Dunkerque.

Brockwell, however, would be the last to say that the preparation was by any means complete. Because there is no such to be done is the reason he is keeping at it day and night. But progress has been made and the tempo of preparation has been speeded up immeasurably since war was declared.

To train firemen in defense against chemical warfare, such as incendiary fires resulting from incendiary bombs from airplanes or from any other source, Brockwell is conducting two schools next month. Eastern firemen meet in Foyville on January 12 and westerners in Charlotte on January 15. In the meantime he has

Hitler Takes Rest Cure

Adriana, Dec. 15.—(Delayed)—Adolf Hitler was reported an informed German quarters tonight to have been forced by an imminent nervous breakdown to quit the Russian front and retire to his Berchtesgaden retreat for a rest.

His doctors told Hitler that he had strained his nervous system to the breaking point for several months, most of which he has spent at field headquarters on the eastern front directing the German campaign in Russia, the informants said.

They warned him that the consequences of a continued heavy strain on his physical resources might be serious.

Hitler finally agreed to go to the German mountain retreat where an instant of absolute relaxation for rest cure.


The woman, 14, was held because she told him she had been married to a white man.



SECRET WEAPON OF JAP NAVY IS TINY SUB

Washington, Dec. 17.—Japan's so-called secret naval weapon is a tiny, two-man submarine—a "suicide" craft that can loose torpedoes or hurl itself at enemy ships with the same destruction effect of a torpedo, the navy revealed today.

The secret was exposed by the capture of one of the midgets during the December 7 Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

The navy found that the tiny sub "carries a 300-pound charge of high explosives under the stern, wired to the battery so it can be used as a demolition charge either for the submarine itself in case of attack or against ships or harbor objectives."

The craft also carries two 18-inch torpedoes. Standard size American submarines, some seven times the length of the pygmies, carry 21-inch torpedoes.

There were indications, the navy said, that the captured "suicide" sub was launched from a mother ship about 100 miles off the Hawaiian island of Oahu.

(Two other Japanese subs—one a midget the other the conventional type—were sunk during the attack.)

Describing the suicide element, the navy said "there are indications the personnel operating the submarines desperate, even to self-sacrifice, to will go to any extreme, however crazy out their objective."

The navy said the Japanese "suicide" subs are of such size that they could be carried on the deck of larger craft and launched overside by the same cranes and facilities used for handling the small boats of a combat ship.

They have a cruising radius of 200 miles at low speed and are powered by electric motors with a designated top speed of 24 knots.

The craft captured is 41 feet long, has a beam of five feet and a conning tower four and a half feet above the deck. The quarter-inch plate hull is divided into five compartments, two of which house the electric batteries used for operating the motors. The subs are equipped with a gyrocompass, a magnetic compass, radio equipment and underwater sound and listening devices.

Their crew consists of one officer and one rating.

Living quarters are extremely cramped. The amount of supplies and fuel is necessarily limited. Naval experts estimate they would be able to remain at sea five days before returning to the mother ship or base.

How many such subs the Japanese possess is not known but it is possible that "schools" of them may be used against the allied naval forces in the Pacific.


Chief asset of the little craft is its ability to operate in shallow waters, thus enabling them to get through harbor defenses.


