Power Pool Proposal Waits Action

Raleigh, May 20.—The recently published report that the war production board had given the State Rural Electrification Authority permission to go ahead with the proposed super-cooperative power pool in eastern North Carolina was in error.

"We are in the same position we have been for weeks", said J. M. Granger, the REA engineer. "We are still waiting for approval from Washington."

What happened was that the WPB urged the formation of power pools for war purposes. That may indicate favorable action on the eastern North Carolina project but nothing more. The municipalities, cooperatives, power companies and military posts concerned with the proposed super-cooperative long ago did everything the WPB is now advising. For months they have been waiting for the WPB to give its OK on the purchase of the immense amount of material needed in \$1,500,000 high tension line which would connect the several generating plants.

Just as pressure from the Army and Navy is necessary to secure approval for almost any kind of construction nowadays, so it is with the proposed pool. However, the Navy already has joined in the movement and even that has not proved effective to date. The chief argument for tying up the small municipal and cooperative generating plants of eastern Carolina at this time is that more power is needed for the Marine bases on New River and at Cherry Point.

According to the plans for the pool now before the WPB, the pool would be connected with the Carolina Power and Light Company, the Virginia Electric and Power Company and the Tidewater Power Company as well as with the municipal plants. After the war it would mean the industrial development of the entire section, the REA believes.

Carolina Baseball Team Accomplishes Much With Little

Chapel Hill, May 20.—For a baseball team that averaged only 270 in hitting and had only one experienced pitcher, the University of North Carolina nine accomplished a lot with a little.

Duke, Wake Forest, and N. C. State, three of Carolina's foremost rivals in the State and Southern Conference competition, all outfit the Tar Heels this season but none of them was as successful as Coach Tomm Herrin's boys in making their hits count.

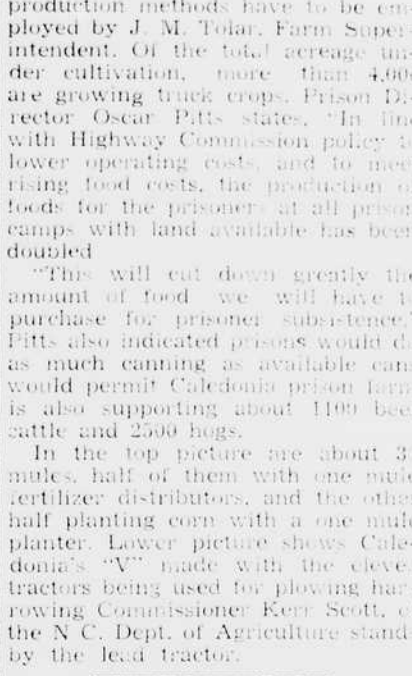
