High School Summer Term Opens Monday

Classes in regular summer school at Henderson high school will be begun next Monday and will run for six weeks, or a total of thirty school days, W. D. Payne, principal, announced today. All students desiring to take summer courses are requested to report at the high school Monday at 10 a. m.

Prof. R. B. Harrison and Mrs. E. E. Nanny, of the faculty, will be in charge and will teach all courses offered.

Students may remove conditions occurring during the past year or take new work entirely. Condition status includes those whose grades range from 60 to 69, and failures below 60. Four hours of work daily will be required for failed work.

Whether the classes will be held at the high school or at Junior high will depend on the number applying for courses, Mr. Payne said. That will be decided when applicants report Monday.

A small tuition fee will be charged of those taking summer school courses.
