Atlantic City, N. J., May 27.—(AP)—The golf form that made Harry Cooper one of the game's most sensational competitors in the middle thirties appeared suddenly to have returned as he sailed around the Seaview country club course in 67-11 to capture medalist honors in the qualifying test for the P. G. A. championship.

USO Drive For \$1,600 In County To Begin Tuesday

Hope to Get Quota in Two Days Designated; Meeting of Workers is Held to Complete Plans; More Workers Needed. Ministers Asked To Urge Support USO Drive Here

W. R. Vaughan, chairman of the USO drive for Vance county, today appealed to the ministers of the city and county to remind their congregations Sunday morning of the USO drive here, and to urge liberal contributions to the fund. Vance county is asked to raise \$1,600 in the nationwide drive.

Further plans for the campaign to raise \$1,600 for the United Service Organizations in the county were discussed at a meeting of workers with W. R. Vaughan, chairman of the drive, tonight.

The advance committee, of which J. P. B. Council is chairman, is to meet Thursday night and to begin its work today, carrying through Monday in all parts of the county as far as possible as a matter of general solicitation.

Distribution of literature began today. Posters will be placed in store windows and pamphlets explaining the work of the USO are being sent to stage men at the airport.

United Service Organizations is an agency which supplies recreational facilities under civilian direction in the vicinity of training camps both in the United States and abroad. The government cooperates, but does not take the initiative.

Six national agencies are combining to make up the 1942 drive: the Young Men's Christian Association, the National Catholic Community Service, The Salvation Army, the Young Women's Christian Association, the Jewish Welfare Board and the National Travelers Aid Association.

USO itself plans, finances and supervises all operations conducted under its name, both from national headquarters and through local USO committees. It relies on its six partner agencies to staff and operate its clubs in the United States, but itself conducts all services outside the continental United States.

The \$1,600 asked of Vance county is part of a nationwide drive for \$22,000,000. In addition to the \$1,600 in the city, the USO drive will reach into the rural areas, and children have been named in part of these and will be on the other before the work gets under way.

Leaders in the movement hope to wind up the drive with its goal reached during the two days designated for solicitation.

New Project To Replace Sewing Room

A housekeeping aid project sponsored by Vance county under the federal Works Projects Administration program will start June 1 and will take the place of the WPA sewing room which has been operated since the early days of the government relief undertakings. It was announced today by Miss Clara MacEllis, Vance county superintendent of welfare. The sewing room will be closed as of June 1.

The new WPA program will be a service project for the benefit of families living sickness and being unable to employ practical nurses and housekeepers.

Housekeeping aid workers will receive instruction at the county on Advanced Home Science, which was formerly used by the YWA, and after a week's training will be ready to go into the field to help the needy.

Miss Ellis said that nine of ten women will be employed in the new program and these will include persons formerly employed in the sewing room and on the school lunch program, who have been unable to make other arrangements for employment. The WPA will not employ any new workers in any project, she said.

PROPOSED MEASURE HITS LABOR UNIONS

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Legislation "taking labor unions liable to prosecution under the 1934 anti-racketeering act was sent to the house today by its judiciary committee.

It was the first of three major labor measures to win full committee approval in recent weeks, and members predicted the other two would be acted on quickly. They would require labor organizations to file periodic statements of their receipts and expenditures, and put them within the scope of anti-trust laws.

Sponsored by Representative Hobbs, Democrat, Alabama, the measure approved today in closed session does not mention unions by name but was drafted to hit a recent Supreme Court ruling that unions were beyond the scope of the 1934 act.
