Some calculations that have been made show that a ten cents tax levy for four years would yield approximately \$18,000 annually, or \$72,000 for the period. Issue of new bonds each year for four years in the amount equal to two-thirds of debt service liquidation would provide an estimated additional \$52,422. Sunday was the longest and hottest day of the year thus far, according to official records today. The maxinum mercury reading in the afteroon was 97, officially announced by the Weather Bureau observer today. Today's weather forecast was for continued hot and sultry weather his afternoon and tonight.

There was next to no stirring of the air Sunday or Sunday night, and many people found their rest for the night was distributed by the stuffy atmosphere, with no relief to be hand.

According to the calendars, June 21 is the longest day of the year, Officially, the sun rose Sunday at 4.31 a. m. and set at 7:32 p. m. Summer officially began at 8:37 a. m.

Several days at this immediate period the days are virtually the ame in length and the nights al o, but much shorter. Daytime Sunday was calculated at 15 hours one minute, and night as eight hours,
