Games to Be Played This Month; Tonight Brings Franklinton Teams to Henderson

Basketball games for Henderson high school teams have been scheduled, it was announced today by Principal W. D. Payne of the high school, for five dates following this week-end. Among the games are scheduled for the boys and one is arranged for the girls.

Tonight, boys and girls teams from Franklinton invade the Henderson court, with the curtain raised for 8 o'clock. Tomorrow night, the fast boys team from Goldsboro high school comes here for a single-feature event.

The Bulldogs go to Oxford next Tuesday night for a one-game engagement, both the boys and girls go to Franklinton on February 16; Oxford boys play a return game here February 19; both teams go to Roanoke Rapids on February 19, and Roanoke Rapids teams come here February 20.

The boys' fast team other games are arranged for next week, and scheduled definitely, except this week-end.

The Bulldogs have played six games and won four this season, defeating, respectively, the "Thunderbolts" from Raleigh in two games, and Wake Forest, and coming within a game of Wake Forest. The girls have defeated Wake Forest and have played two exhibition games, one against Greensboro and one with an all-star team which was defeated.

League restrictions on "picnicing" during the season have been in effect during the entire season; there has been good attendance at all games played, and the school spirit has been very enthusiastic over the two strong teams which wear the high school colors, blue and red, and are aided support by members of the ranks scheduled to be played here during the balance of the month.

FARM—In more immediate prospect is a trip of the joint committee on agriculture to McCullers test farm, ten miles south of Raleigh. That trip comes under the head of business rather than of jaunting. The last session of the General Assembly authorized purchase of the farm for experimental and research purposes and it, being closest to Raleigh of all the State test farms, is the logical point of inspection to see what is being done.

WORKING—Members of the house of representatives who are not on important committees found out Thursday that committee members have been really working. The session lasted a full two hours, and less than half the public calendar had reported out of a load of local bills reported out of committee. Committee meetings Thursday began at 9:30 and continued until the open sessions at noon. The house adjourned at 2 o'clock, with the important appropriation group slated to meet right away. Many night meetings of committees are held this week in order to get the work out.

JUVENILE—A group of juvenile and domestic relations court judges met at Raleigh Wednesday to adopt resolutions endorsing a training school for Negro girls, recommended enlargement of the detention school for delinquent Negro boys, and favored raising the compulsory school attendance age to 16. All juvenile judges in the state except two were present, and it is understood that these two have by telephone approved action of the group, making it unanimous. The juvenile judges recognized the State's inability at this time to provide adequate facilities for delinquent boys and girls, but wanted to go on record as favoring a start, however small, toward the desired goal—constitutional provision for all youngsters of any race who are in the legal classification of delinquent.

Pharisees Call Names.

(The International Uniform Lesson on the above topic for Feb. 7, 1943, John 8:12-59, the Golden Text being John 14:9, "He that hath seen Me hath seen the Father.")

"I am the light of the world," said Jesus to those gathered around Him. "He that followeth Me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life."

The Pharisees were scornful. "Thou hearest record of thyself," said they; "the record is not true." Jesus answered, "Though I bear record of myself, yet My record is true; for I know whence I came, and whither I go; but ye cannot tell when I come, and whither I go. Ye judge after the flesh; I judge no man, and yet it I judge, my judgment is true; for I am not alone, and I and the Father who sent me."

Also in this accusation Jesus said, "It is also written in your law, that the testimony of two men is true. I am one that bear witness of Myself, and the Father that sent Me bears witness of Me."

Where is Thy Father? "Where is Thy Father?" they asked, showing that they knew not what Jesus was talking about. "Ye neither know Me nor My Father," He said to them.

Giving these still wicked children an opportunity to do better, there being no one among them who could not understand the meaning of His words, Jesus said to them, "I go, and ye shall seek Me, and shall die in your sins. Whither I go, ye cannot come."

The Jews thought, or pretended to think, that Jesus meant that He would go to the Father. In their own minds was as bad as murder, to say that He had committed a mortal sin, to say that He had committed a mortal sin.

Later Jesus told them, "When ye have lifted up the Son of man, then shall ye know that I am He, and that I do nothing of Myself, but as My Father hath taught Me, I speak these things."

Jesus Anticipates His Death. He meant by this, when they had crucified Him, for well He knew that that was what they meant to do. They would not see that He was the Messiah for whom they had been looking; the Christ that was to save them. They were angry with and jealous of the fact that the common people listened to Him and loved Him for Himself and for the good He did. He did God's will as He said, "The Father hath not left Me alone; for I do always those things that please Him."

When He spoke these words, many believed on Him, and He said to them, "If ye continue in my word, then are ye My disciples indeed; and ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."

How free? they asked; "We be Abraham's seed, and were never in bondage to any man; how sayest Thou, ye shall be free?"

That was a very odd statement to come from the Jews who had been continually in bondage to one people or another for generations. They were under the rule of Rome at the time they were speaking.

"If ye were Abraham's children, ye would do the works of Abraham; but now ye seek to kill Me, a Man that hath told you the truth which I have heard of God; this did not Abraham."

And further He told them, "If God were your Father ye would love Me, for I proceeded forth and came from God; neither came I of myself, but He sent me? Why do ye not understand My speech?"
