Senate Committee Asks Explanation Of Manpower Need

Wickard, McNutt and Nelson Summoned; Shortage of Food Is Predicted

Washington, Feb. 26—(AP)—O'Connor informed that America's expanding military power had soon come lowering of the service's Army-age standard, increasing the average age limit, a Senate investigating committee summoned the nation's manpower planning and war production chiefs today to explain how the necessary food and equipment can be produced this year.

Some members of a Senate manpower subcommittee inquired into manpower problems, noting that the planned growth of the armed forces will leave recruitment workers to turn to suppliers of men for the military, civilians and food items.

As the committee used Secretary of War Harry Woodring was predicted to appear before it. Next in line were Secretary of War Paul V. McNutt and the chairman of the War Resources Board, which is to speak perhaps today.

The panel likely will return a subpoena to appear before the Senate defense committee, now in the American Congress.

Food, meat, dried fruits, are sixth

item in production at 100 per cent of population, and 1,350,000 additional items are off.

The panel, including Johnson, is reported to have about 400 aircraft, consisting of about 25 fighter planes and 375 bombers in a squadron.

Major General Lewis B. Hershey, selective service director, told the committee in response to a query about the Army's refusal to accept men 38 or older, that there were "some very grave doubts in my mind whether we can continue to hold that 38-year line."

An economic year between 13 and 15 million men will be required by 1944, and 15 million can be expected to be available, he said, adding that the Army's manpower plan will be modified to meet the needs of the war, and we must be prepared to do our best to meet it.

And that does not include the 10 million men of the 48th division that would be created in April.

The Johnson panel has been asked to consider whether there should be a draft in the fall.

Lieutenant General Joseph T. McNamara, deputy chief of staff, told the committee that he didn't suspect the nation would eat as well this year as last.

"Last year," he added, "we

had a severe shortage of food."

Work Or Fight Bill Offered

Washington, Feb. 26—(AP)—The House public committee released the war labor action next week, oral testimony before the House, and a bill to be introduced.

It is a bill of a different nature from the so-called bill, the measure would require all men 18 years old to register with their local Selective Service boards every three months, the names of all those employed who have been absent from work without permission. The board then determines whether such workers should be further deferred from the draft.
