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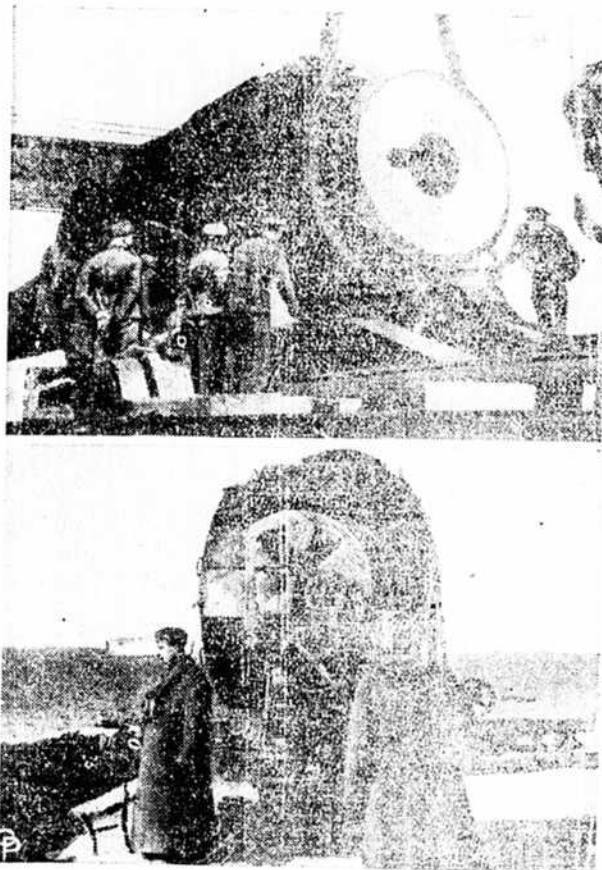

## Axis Bases Blasted By Allied Aircraft

### Fortresses Lead Raids On Big Area

Axis Strongholds From Kiel to Naples Damaged With Heavy Loss of Life

(By The Associated Press) Massive fleets of allied aircraft, including hundreds of American Flying Fortresses, blasted Axis industrial, coastal and shipping strongholds from Kiel in the north to Naples in the south yesterday and today, causing heavy damage and by Axis reports a big loss of life.

Smashing at Naples, key water-front supply port of Tunisia, nearly 100 B-24 Superfortresses, led by Major General James H. Doolittle's four motorized giants carried out the greatest raid of the war on that city's main French North African base Saturday.

When these were followed by a second wave of 100 B-24s, the total force of 200 American Flying Fortresses, many of them B-24s, carried out the greatest raid of the war on that city's main French North African base Saturday.

These blows were followed last night by Britain's big bombers which dropped more than 1,000 tons of bombs on Kiel, German naval base and U-boat building center. Essen, second most blitzed city of the Reich, had its heaviest raid in recent weeks on Saturday night.

Twenty-one ships were hit in Naples harbor, and the Italian high command, a month and a half ago, ordered a month-long halt to the building of U-boats in Sicily and Calabria in Sicily as well as 221 planes were killed and 300 injured at Naples.

The German command at Paris is reporting the British raid as a "severe attack" and that 200 bombers were killed and 300 injured in the raid.

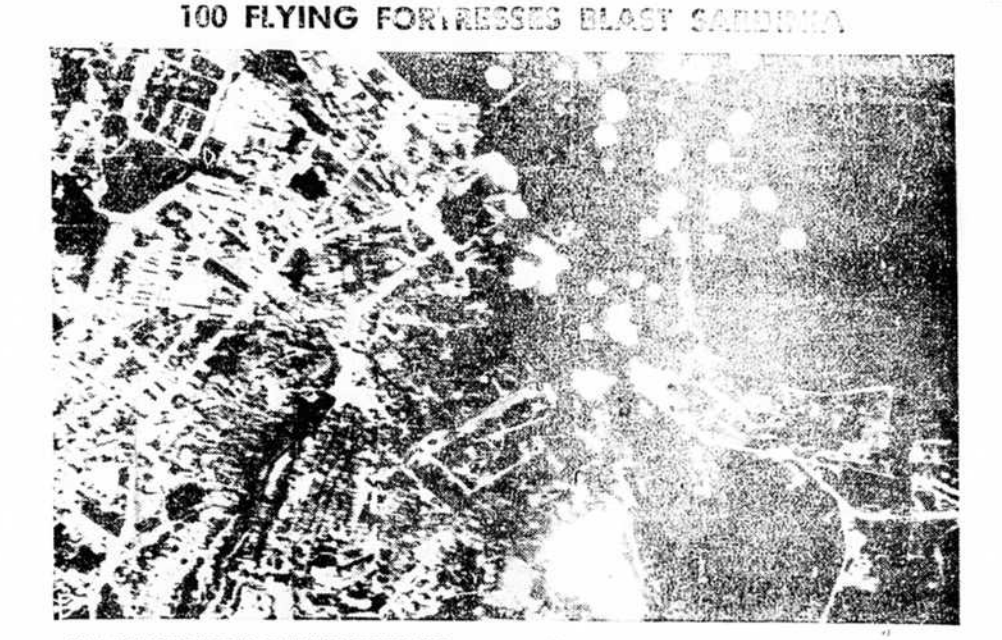
Allied headquarters in Tunis said at least 21 Axis planes were shot down in the bombing of Naples as well as three submarines and a flotilla of U-boats.

### Americans Meet Strong Opposition

Strong Axis Attacks Repulsed as Forces Continue Progress Toward Junction

(By The Associated Press) Doughboys of the second American Army corps were bearing the brunt of action in Tunisia today, as allied headquarters announced the repulse of strong axis counter attacks and continued progress toward a junction with the British eighth army in the area east of El Guejar. The Americans were wiping out German mortar nests and taking prisoners.

Today's communique from allied headquarters in North Africa said the Americans were meeting "strong opposition" as they attempted to solve the axis defense.

They were said to have gained additional ground but the communique gave no specific details of the American position, last reported twelve or 15 miles east of El Guejar and about 10 miles distance from a junction with General Sir H. L. Montgomery's forces on the Gabs-Gafsa road.

The British first army of Lieutenant General Anderson in the north also was said to progress in pushing patrols closer toward Mateur, 16 miles southwest of Bizerte, the main, strategic axis.

The German first army yesterday indicated the British were making heavy gains near Mateur and today's action was announced as the British and the Americans were meeting strong opposition.

The Tunisian front elsewhere was quiet, however, with Montgomery's men still facing out Rommel's defenses along a 20-mile line about 20 miles north of Gabs and straddling the Gabs-Gafsa road where he was taking advantage of a deep gulch and a string of hills.

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### Hull Urges Trade Pacts

Secretary of State Declares That U. S. Must Show 'Sincerity Of Purpose' to World

Washington, April 5—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull told Congress today that the United States must demonstrate now its "sincerity of purpose" and willingness to bear its share of responsibility in world affairs by extending the administration's authority to write reciprocal trade agreements.

His opinion was laid before the national lawmakers as the House appropriations committee released testimony on a new \$150,729,400 financial program, including an increase for the public works and construction program for the fiscal year of 1944.

Hull's address, describing the reciprocal trade agreements as of paramount importance in promoting the well-being of the people, came at a hearing on the extension of the public works program.

Many changes in the political and economic organization of the U. S. will be necessary to achieve a high standard of living and to bring about a more equitable distribution of income, he said.

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### Farm, Food And Manpower Bills Vie For Attention

#### Presidential Veto May be Overridden; Ceiling Prices Set On 102 Cuts of Meat

Washington, April 5—(AP)—Farm, food and labor legislation vied for Capitol attention today as the House passed a bill to place specific ceilings on retail sales of beef, veal, lamb and mutton, effective April 15.

Whipping and the store-to-store meat price maximums which permitted any establishment to charge its highest rates of March, 1942, the act set the ceilings on each grade at 102 cents of the various meats in each of twelve zones.

However, in arguing that the veto be overridden, four national farm organizations declared the President's stand made it "apparent that once more agriculture is to be used as the whipping boy to further appease the wage demand of organized labor and to divert attention from the real source of inflation."

Other committees arranged to hear witnesses on a half-dozen controversial questions ranging from post-war reconstruction to the atomic energy bill.

#### Juvenile Crime Mounts

Washington, April 5—(AP)—The United States today is suffering from a mounting juvenile crime problem, according to a report by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The report, which is the first in a series of reports on juvenile crime, says that the number of juvenile delinquents in the United States has increased steadily since 1930.

The report also says that the majority of juvenile delinquents are boys, and that the majority of them are from the lower socioeconomic classes.

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#### Draft Quotas Are Reduced

Washington, April 5—(AP)—Major Charles H. Jones of the State Department today announced that the draft quotas for men in the United States have been reduced.

The reduction in draft quotas is the result of a new classification system for men in the United States.

The new classification system will allow men to be classified as "essential" or "non-essential" for the war effort.
