MacArthur's 'BLACK MARKET' Airmen Raid Ten Bases

Violent Three-Day Pounding Fails To Halt Massing Of Nipponese Forces

General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters announced today that allied warplanes pounded at least ten Japanese bases in sweeps over the islands above Australia, but the enemy continued to mass warships and merchant vessels in one vicinity of Kavieng despite a violent three-day pounding.

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
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Health Week Girl
