Aid Pledged MacArthur

Secretary Stimson Promises Planes And Other Material For South Pacific

Washington, April 15.—(AP)—A constantly increasing flow of aircraft and other military supplies was promised today by Secretary of War Stimson for the forces of General Douglas MacArthur in the southwest Pacific.

OPA Delays Price Limit

Ceiling on Cotton Will Not be Made While Market Open To Normal Trading

Washington, April 15.—(AP)—OPA said in a statement today no announcement regarding cotton prices "will be made during the course of trading in the cotton market in order that there be no interruption of normal trading."

Draft Eligible U.S. Employees Under Fire

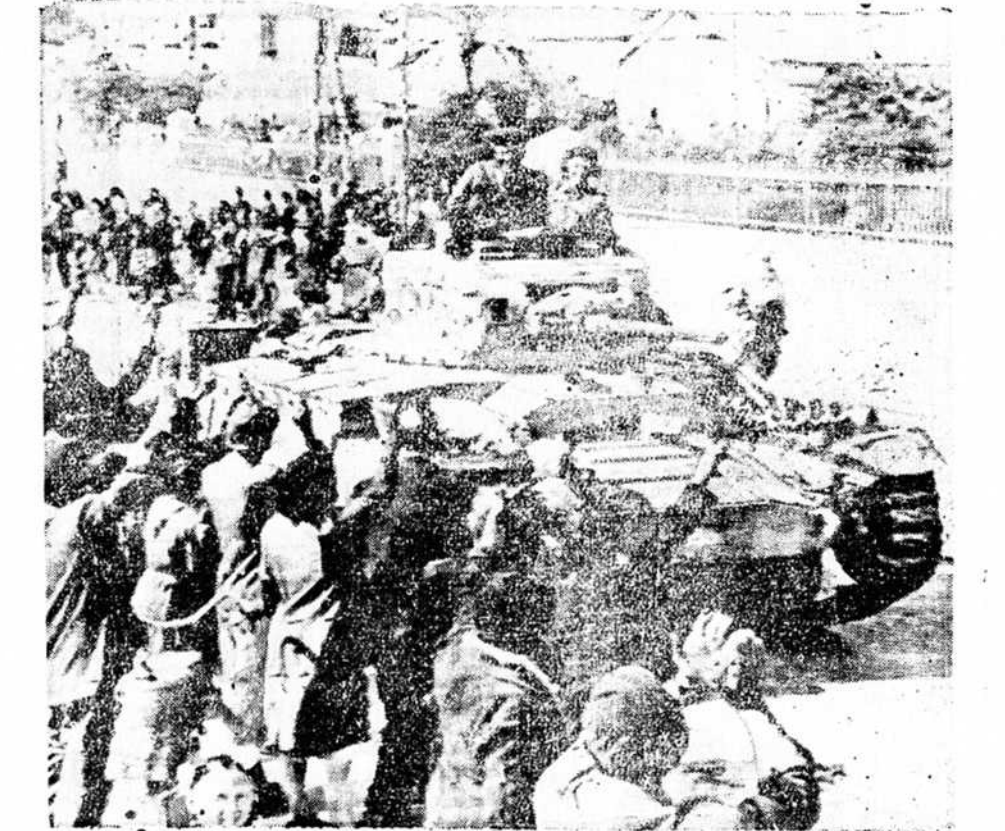
JAP AIRMEN SUSTAIN SUICIDAL LOSSES

MacArthur Renews Call For Planes

Japanese Assaults In Southwest Pacific Result in Losses Nearing 30 Per Cent

(By The Associated Press) General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters disclosed today that suicidal losses ranging upward of 30 per cent were inflicted on a Japanese armada of 75 to 100 planes attempting to raid Milne Bay, New Guinea, but simultaneously new official warnings were sounded on the need for greater allied strength in the south Pacific skies.

Last Stand Of Germans Assaulted

Allied Forces Drive On Three Main Fronts In Northern Tunisia; Other News of War

(By The Associated Press) Allied headquarters disclosed today that General Sir B. L. Montgomery's British eighth army had begun to storm the main axis defense line at Enfidaville, 50 miles below Tunis, and that German and Italian prisoners captured since March 20 had risen to 30,000.

RAF Raids Stuttgart

Nazi Industrial City Is Heavily Bombed; 23 Planes Missing; London Has Alert

London, April 15.—(AP)—Britain's powerful four-engine bombers rained 100 miles across Nazi-held Europe last night to strike at the German industrial city of Stuttgart in a highly concentrated raid from which 23 bombers failed to return, the air ministry announced today.

Raid Record Set At Kiska

Washington, April 15.—(AP)—The Aleutians raid more completely broke all previous records for number of attacks on Kiska in a single day, the Navy reported today. The 100-bomber raid lasted for 10 hours and 15 minutes, dropping a total of 1,200 bombs.

Giraud Plans Army Purge

Algiers, April 15.—(AP)—An authoritative source said today that General Henri Giraud had ordered a purge of all pro-Axis and Vichy-minded officers from the French army.

Cold Hurts N.C. Crops
