

McDonald Quits UNC

His Resignation Accompanied by Word That He Will Run For Governor

Raleigh, April 16—Announcement of resignation from the University of North Carolina by Dr. Ralph McDonald, long a stormy petrel in North Carolina politics, accompanied by his statement that he will be in the race for governor of North Carolina next year. The announcement hasn't the news value that such a statement might be expected to carry, because it had been so thoroughly anticipated.

The doctor has been "running" for months, despite all the protestations of Governor Hoey, Dr. Frank Graham and other responsible figures, of his university connection that McDonald had promised to "be good" so far as political activity was concerned. The current statement does not involve resignation as vice-president of the North Carolina Teachers' Association, to which McDonald was recently elected, and it is presumed that he will hold that post for awhile, at least.

The teacher's association has been pecked deep in politics all the while, but always more or less on the side lines. Whether an association official would gain or lose political support by reason of his office has never been tested. It may be put to the test now.

Following the 1936 gubernatorial campaign when McDonald came within a hair's breadth of winning the nomination—and thousands of North Carolinians still believe he did win it and was counted out—he suf-

fered a physical breakdown, and a period of hospitalization. Soon he was able to go back to work, he was given the post as assistant director of extension education at the university. At the time Governor Hoey and Dr. Graham were severely criticized, but they said the doctor was through with politics. He wasn't.

In the 1940 campaign he issued a public statement calling upon his former supporters to rally around Broughton as their best friend. He and the governor have not seen eye to eye on every proposition but generally have worked together very well. Biggest split was when McDonald backed Dick Reynolds for national committeeman against his former opponent, later his benefactor, Clyde Hoey, whom Broughton supported for the honorary post—and who won it.

Taken with the definite statement a few days ago by Judge Wilson Warlick that he would be a candidate for governor and the generally understood candidacy of State Senator Gregg Cherry, the McDonald entry virtually assures a lively three-way contest next summer.

Home Folk Cooperate

Raleigh, April 16—In the midst of a world at war when international cooperation seems at its lowest ebb for many years, the pages of daily newspapers carrying numerous articles of a cooperative spirit among the people of North Carolina.

There is the story of a conference at Elon College when some 23 ministers of the Evangelical and Reformed churches met with the Piedmont conference of Congregational Christian churches to discuss plans for a merger of the two denominations.

There is another story about a small town church whose pastor had been called into active duty as an Army chaplain, offering its house of worship—with heat—or a rival church of another denomination with a good pastor but no fuel oil. The congregations got together very happily.

Other stories, well authenticated, deal with a farmer who had difficulties but needed manpower swapping with the neighbor who had extra help but no mules with a farm woman who needed wood cut but had no saw, trading with a neighbor who had a saw but needed some other equipment; of several farmers pooling community needs so that on a trip to town brought back a few bags of hay, some bricks and some seed corn—thus saving two wagon loads a day's time.

These homely instances, illustrating a spirit of neighborly cooperation, pointed upon the large story of a global war being the way toward solution of many problems which the wisemen in international councils might study with profit.

WAR JOB TRAINING OFFERED TO YOUTHS

Recent placement of youth completing training in the Raleigh, Greensboro, and Durham YVA centers have created more openings in the training centers for additional youths, it was stated today.

Any youth between the ages of 16 and 25 years, desiring to add to the war effort and to equip himself with a trade for a peacetime future, may acquire information by writing the Youth Personnel Officer, Box 1983, Raleigh.

Training is offered by the National Youth Administration-War Manpower Commission in such fields as aircraft trades, and machine shop, welding and related trades. Training is free, including free room and board, and a small salary is paid while in training. Placement in war jobs is offered immediately on completion of training.

Canning Tops Food Problems

Raleigh, April 15—With wartime need for conserving every item of food supply enhanced by prospective short fruit and vegetable crops due to late cold weather, most governmental agencies are giving serious study to the 1944 food canning problem. Without overlooking commercial plants, emphasis is being placed on home canning.

The home economics division of State College Extension Service has issued several news stories urging care in preparation of vegetables for canning, and impressing upon house-

wives the importance of steam pressure canning, only for non-acid products. It was reported that the state would need about 10,000 pressure canning outfits this year. Applications have already been received for more than 6,000 from just 40 counties. Anticipated shortage of presses need for a neighborly spirit in making fullest use of available outfits.

The state office of price administration announced this week that the fuel oil ration system would be adjusted to assure home canners of necessary kerosene and gasoline for canning operations.

Vivian Whitfield, representing the Farm Bureau and the State Department of Conservation and Development in promotion of dehydration and canning, was in Raleigh Wednesday speaking up efforts to get all possible canning plants in operation during the summer.

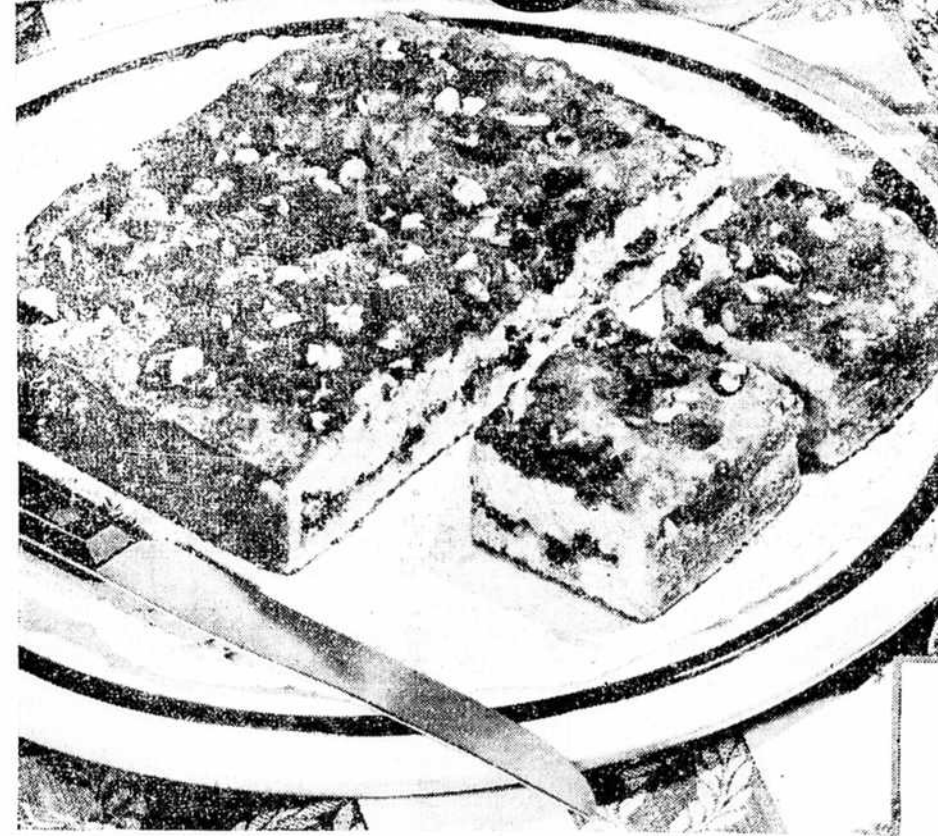
