## OPA Price System Change Is Expected

The entire method of price control for food may be changed on any day, says Arthur H. Surprise, secretary of the Henderson Chamber of Commerce.

Runners of a complete revision of price control of foods have been circulated from time to time. Nothing definite has been hinted from inside sources as to the exact procedure which would replace the present method of limited per centages of profit over cost.

In a letter from J. LeRoy Allen, secretary of the North Carolina Food Dealers Association, today, Surprise was told that "practically all of this is expected to be changed within the next couple of weeks."

Allen is continually in close touch with the state and national OPA offices. The effect as to the nature of the new regulation, Surprise says, was the general maximum price order applicable to Hawaii, which was issued late last week.

In the Hawaiian plan is used in continental United States, Surprise says the prices may be reduced on many items. One specific item, Surprise says, the drastic nature of the cut in price of Main sardines can be bought at retail in Hawaii for less than the wholesale price, almost for less than the cost to the wholesaler in Henderson.

The new Hawaiian price order sets up the maximum prices which may be charged at wholesale and retail levels, designated by grade, and requiring grade marking or the acceptance of the lowest grade price, Surprise says. Confidential information indicates the Hawaiian regulation was issued along the lines planned for the new continental order.

### Oxford Man Sentenced

Raleigh, April 29—(AP)—Francis Finch, 28-year-old Oxford man, yesterday was given a sentence of 18 months in a Federal reformatory after conviction in Federal Court here on OPA charges of illegal possession, sale and receiving of gasoline ration books.

Federal Judge I. M. Meekins also sentenced Finch to 30 days in the Wake County Jail on nine counts of possession and sale of gas ration coupons. The sentence suspended on 18-months probation to begin at the expiration of the reformatory sentence.

## Salvation Army's Work Enumerated

Work of the local corps of the Salvation Army from the first of the year through last Sunday was shown in a summary made public today by Envoys Charles Cook, in charge.

Under the head of spiritual activities 19 conversions were reported among adults and 32 among juveniles, for a total of 51. Thirty-five open air meetings were held, with an estimated attendance of 3,560, and there were 97 indoor meetings with an attendance of 2,533.

Young people's activities included 17 Sunday school sessions, with an attendance of 884; 13 out-post meetings and an attendance of 345; B. of L. meetings for children up to 10 years; 17 meetings, attendance 489. Total meetings with children were 70. De-

visions were held in public schools. Visitation was made to 344 homes, with 210 hours consumed. Thirty-six transients were assisted with 42 given lodging and meals to thirty. There were 50 family relief cases. Garments in the number of 162 were given, with 19 pairs of shoes, six medical services, groceries to 17, and 200 loaves of bread and eight beds and mattresses given. The value was placed at \$462.19. This does not include social work on sums spent on egg hunts for more than 700 children.

Jobs were furnished for three persons and three families suffering loss in fires were helped.
