Battle Priorities

Just as there are priorities in certain scarce materials, so it seems there has been, still is and for some time may continue to be a choice as to which side of the world will receive most attention from the United Nations in their overall strategy aimed at extermination of the Axis.

Earlier in the week Senator Chandler took a shot at Britain's part in the Pacific war and of Russia's failure to enter it, and demanded that the high command turn the weight of Allied might against Japan.

The senator's outgiving is merely a part of differences of opinion that inevitably exist in so vast a country as this on so vital a matter. It has its counterpart in Britain, and would have in Axis countries were not the people muzzled, and with bayonets in their ribs to boot to keep them in line and their mouths closed.

Clearly, we cannot all have the leading voice in how the war will be won. That must be left to the head strategists, such as the President, the generals, the admirals and the like, together with like authorities in Britain, Russia and China.

Mr. Churchill in his address to Congress Wednesday seemed to answer the Chandler outburst by pledging British participation in the finish fight with Japan, and rightly said his own country had as much to do in the Far East as the United States. He remembered but left the loss of the great Singapore base, which had been considered impracticable to which, like so many other strong phrases, was grossly overstated.

Churchill's assurance that the British will be in there fighting "side by side with you" while there is breath in our bodies and blood flows in our veins" was reassuring, and had the ring of being definitely more than mere platitudes phrases to bolster the morale of the American non-believers.

Some military authorities on the Far East have lately given it as their opinion that Japan is left virtually unimpeded for another year or two, and it may be impossible to dislodge her from the speedy conquests of a year ago. Many others evidently share these views and are worried and alarmed. Slowness and difficulty experienced in such offensive operations have been made to not cause minds gripped by these fears.

But Senator Chandler might well have omitted his criticism of Russia's failure to enter the Pacific war, which means the Soviets have done a marvelous job, and if it is true that they have not left equal to standing at two fronts, it is still a good job, and for Stalin's grand campaign in European Russia, Mr. Churchill might not long be in Washington, telling our President Roosevelt to be slow on his camp nations' business, or differences of gravity, which may have with Russia, let us say, to keep them from our side, until the crisis has passed.

When Hitler is disposed of, they will be a good deal, we think, of this world's attention toward Japan. She has even to settle with Nippon as well as the United States and Britain. Eastern Siberia is quiet today only men on armed truce. And it would be forgotten that the Soviet see their hands full with Hitler, and cannot be justly criticized for not pulling a fast with Japan.

While we share the views of those who think the tempo of war might with profit be stepped up in the Pacific, we cannot escape a leaning toward the theory that it is still our strategy to get rid of the Nazis first. We suspect, too, that as soon as the Churchill party is safely back in England things will begin to pop in Europe on a bigger scale than anything hitherto seen there or elsewhere.

It was found that 69 per cent of the men and 66 per cent of the women questioned read a full page ad about what a big steel company was doing for the war. Another ad about half page size dealing with domestic electrical appliances going to war instead of into homes was read by 54 per cent of the men and 56 per cent of the women.

The women are handed an inadvertent compliment in other results of the survey. An ad praising the public for patience and consideration was read by more women than men, while one telling how to make cars last longer with old tires and batteries attracted nearly three times as many men.

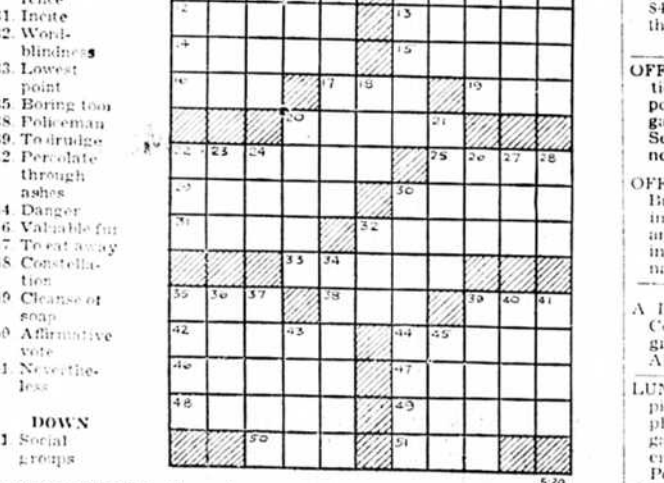
WOLF AT THE DOOR—1943
