Packard Workers End Their Strike In Detroit Plant

Detroit, June 5—(AP)—Several thousand Packard Motor Car Company workers who struck Thursday in a dispute over racial relations in the plant, returned to their jobs this morning.

Although the message did not use the word "resumption" it was the equivalent of a "resumption."

Meanwhile, the steel coal operators and union leaders returned to the bargaining table, but whether they would actually negotiate the issues today was an open question.

Indications from the coal fields were that full production would be under way again the first of the week.

The international significance of yesterday's bold stroke by General Rawson and other military leaders in forcing President Ramon Castillo to flee to an Argentine warship still was not clear, but there were these factors:

1. One of the first acts of the provisional government was the arrest of a prominent pro-Axis nationalist, Manuel Fresco.

2. One of several proclamations said to have been issued by Rawson pledged Argentina's cooperation in a "true American union of collaboration and compliance with our international duties."

3. Pro-democratic newspapers published an announcement said to emanate from the revolutionaries, pledging compliance with a resolution adopted by the conference of American foreign ministers at Rio de Janeiro recommending that all American republics break with the Axis.

Some reports, however, indicated the objectives of the revolutionaries were largely domestic.
