GREENSBORO COMPLETE CITY RELIGIOUS CENSUS

Greensboro—An all-out city-wide religious census has just been completed by the religious forces of this city. One thousand, one hundred and twenty workers in 560 teams from 43 churches, representing Jews, Catholics and Protestants, cooperated wholeheartedly in the undertaking. The census, under the direction of a steering committee appointed by the Greensboro Ministerial Association and headed by Rev. Wilson Woodcock of the College Park Baptist Church, was begun on May 24 and completed May 29. Reports throughout the city are being received by the census workers, and it is expected that the assessment has been given to the city council. It is reported that the assessment has a most vital importance to the city, and that it will be the only one of its kind in the South.

COUNCIL REPORTS ON BIBLE TEACHING IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The North Carolina Council of Churches has issued a report on the teaching of the Bible in public schools. The report states that the Bible should be taught in public schools as a part of the general education of the child. It is the opinion of the council that the Bible should be taught in a way that is objective and non-sectarian. BIRMINGHAM LAUNCHES NEW PROGRAM FOR YOUTH

Birmingham—A new youth and school service program was launched here June 3. The program is a daily visitation service which will be held in the city and equipped school buildings. These Bible schools, which are being sponsored by the Birmingham Ministerial Association, will be conducted by the best qualified teachers available and are so located as to be accessible to all children in the city. Continuity, which is one of the chief aims of the program, is expected to be maintained by the teaching of the scriptures at all times, and where needed efforts are being put forth to bring religious groups, all of which are in the most successful of all.

WILMINGTON COUNCIL OF CHURCHES ORGANIZED

Wilmington—A new Council of Churches has been organized here. The council is composed of representatives from 27 different churches. The council's first act was to elect a pastor. The council also has elected a board of directors. The council is expected to be a most successful one in the future.

C. P. S. CAMP MOVING OUT OF STATE

Macon—The Civilian Public Service Camp which has been operated by the American Friends Service Committee at Buck Creek, near here, is being moved to Gatlinburg, Tenn. Dr. Raymond Burton, president emeritus of Guilford College, who is director of this camp, declares that the new location will have several superior features. Not only will the physical equipment of the camp be better, but the location is better situated for the work which will be done. The new location will be in a more beautiful area, and in other ways improving the status of the American National Park. The C. P. S. men will be the only workers in an area of 485,000 acres.
