Beer Curfew Law Violation Costs License

Raleigh, June 17.—The 1943 statute imposes mandatory revocation of license for any dealer convicted of selling liquor or wine between the hours of 11:30 p. m. and 7 a. m., and neither the court nor any other person or agency has any discretion in the matter, according to opinion of Attorney General Harry McMillan released for publication today.

Municipal corporations have the right to agree to furnish fire protection within an area of not more than twelve miles from the city limits upon such terms as the governing body may determine, it was held in another ruling.
