Army Stops Race Riots In Detroit

U. S. Troops Patrol Trouble Area; 23 Dead, Over 700 Hurt In Day and Night

Detroit, June 22—(AP)—An army-enforced peace settled upon riot-torn Detroit today with the aid of the military in grim combat of the areas where racial fight had spread with corpses and destruction.

Ordered by President Roosevelt in a formal proclamation to detain, and with steel helmeted federal troops supporting his command, white and Negro antagonists skulked into hiding after having caused the deaths of 23 persons—20 of them Negroes—making a calamitous day and night.

At least 700 persons were injured and approximately 1,200 arrested and still held this morning. Of the total number under arrest, police estimated about 25 per cent were Negroes.

On the streets where the blood of both Negro and white had run, 1,100 soldiers marched in patrol to assist the state militia, state police and city police. Early today authorities said conditions were "quiet."

The troops, taking up to trucks and jeeps and armed with rifles and machine guns, reached Cadillac square, heart of the city, in four action-packed hours. Word of their arrival spread quickly. Within 30 minutes, police said, the situation had much improved.

By midnight the situation seemed under full control.

A related incident which occurred at the Fort Custer, Mich., Army post last night was reported today in a statement released by Colonel Ralph Wiltamuth, post commander.

"Members of one of the Negro quarters' battalions," the statement said, "after being to sleep, were awakened by a loud explosion at 11:30 p. m. They were promptly arrested. The men had become restless over the disturbance in Detroit and wanted to go to assist their families. Prompt action by military authorities quickly restored order. Five men were confined in the post stocks awaiting investigation."

President Roosevelt, in a preliminary statement from Washington, "declared that all persons engaged in unlawful and seditious practices" relative to these riots. He called for "all good citizens" to "uphold the laws and preserve the public peace."

At 2 a. m. E. W. Bingham, federal William G. Jones of the State police, reported no further serious trouble.

Attack on Nazi City Is One of Heaviest of War; U. S. Bombers Raid Ruhr in Daytime

London, June 22—(AP)—United States bombers attacked on German Ruhr in daylight today in a heavy succession onto a paratrooper base night raid in Krefeld.

It was the first attack by U. S. bombers on this vital area of the Ruhr since it was captured by British night raiders.

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White House Move Likely In Strike

Ickes and Lewis Continue Conference as Coal Shortage Hinders War Industry

Washington, June 22—(AP)—Direct action by the White House was viewed today as possible within 18 hours unless the nation's 521,000 striking coal miners unexpectedly return to work before then.

Without Presidential intervention the only hopeful sign in the troubled coal situation was a series of conferences between Interior Secretary Ickes, government operator of the mines, and John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers. They met yesterday, kept silent about what was discussed, and gave out only that the talks were continuing today.

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Lewis Meets With Ickes

Washington, June 22—(AP)—John L. Lewis and Secretary Ickes conferred again today on the coal controversy, which has closed the mines in a tight strike, even as the war labor board was disclosed by calling the White House intervention.

Ickes and Lewis met for an hour and a half and declined to say what had happened. Lewis said nothing at all, and Ickes said only that the talks were continuing today.

Jap Bases Under Attack

Washington, June 22—(AP)—All plans for a heavy Japanese invasion of the Philippines were announced today by the Navy, which said also that using Japanese submarines had been abandoned.

During the afternoon of June 20, the Navy commander, Admiral Frank J. Fletcher, said that the Japanese had been detected in the Philippines and that the Navy was preparing to attack them.

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Great Fires Set Blazing In Naples

Flying Fortresses Continue Assaults Begun Sunday Night by Wellingtons

London, June 22—(AP)—Twenty-five great fires, one covering an area a mile in diameter, were left blazing in the port of Naples and in the nearby air stores depot of Capua today by allied bombers yesterday which began their attack before dawn and continued it into the afternoon.

In a similarly timed assault, British and American heavy bombers from the Middle East command rained the Italian cities of Reggio Calabria and San Giovanni before dawn and again by daylight demolishing a harbor mole and scattering destruction in the wake of allied headquarters, warning that the air war is to be extended widely to Mussolini's factories and inland cities as well as to his ports.

Major General James H. Doolittle's command also carried out the first medium bomber missions against the Italian mainland, and with the P-38 Lightning escorts blasted the railroad yards and other objectives at Salerno and scored 25 direct hits on railroad stations. British Wellington bombers, the shock-bomber force, began the onslaught against Naples, Italy's greatest port, Sunday night with their cargoes of high explosives and incendiaries which started a number of fires.

Then an armada of 100 Flying Fortresses probed up the task by daylight and smashed through the atmosphere in the same smoldering target. Within 20 minutes 20 to 40 enemy planes, two flights of the huge winged B-24, rained bombs throughout the Naples industrial area, hitting a number of factories, shops, and homes, the exact extent and damage being reported in the coming days.

The German command, according to reports from the Associated Press, said numerous blocks of buildings and two hospitals were destroyed at Krefeld in an explosive and fire raid which caused great damage, especially in residential quarters. The Germans said they destroyed 39 planes.
