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## Africa-Based Planes Continue Assaults On Italian Islands

### Olbia in Sardinia and Comiso in Sicily Are Raided; Fires Started Both Places

Allied Headquarters in North Africa, June 21—(AP)—British heavy bombers from the Middle East command swept across the Mediterranean to attack the enemy airbase at Comiso in Sicily on Tuesday night while twin-engine Wellingtons from northwest Africa targeted Olbia in northern Sardinia.

Communications said the heavy bombers caused two violent explosions and set two large fires and a number of smaller fires at the Comiso airfield and that the Wellingtons left several fires burning in the Olbia docks.

Part of the Association of the United States was reported to have been destroyed yesterday. One of the destroyers was reported to have been damaged.

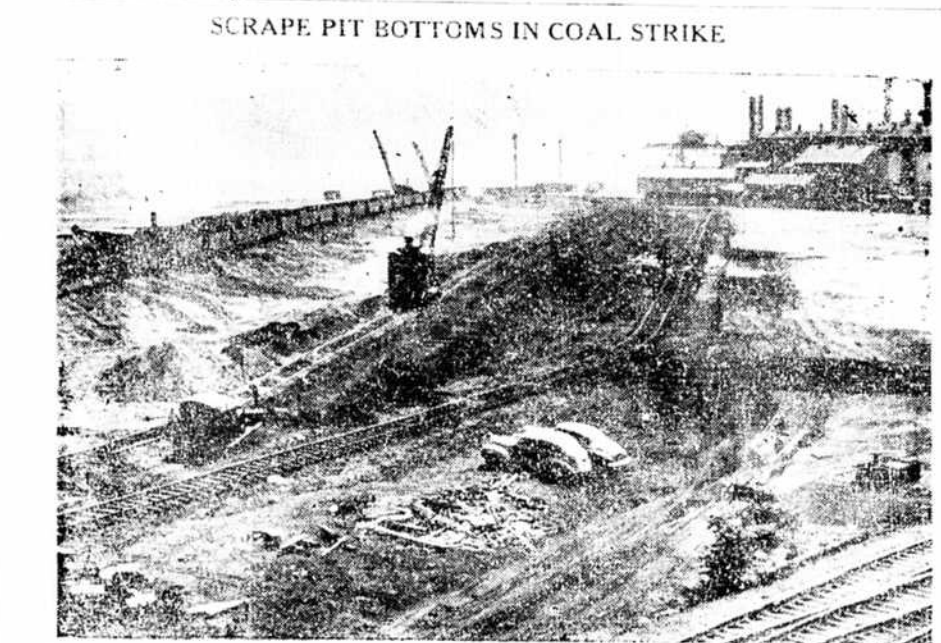

## Planes Fly To Africa And Back

### Friedrichshafen Bombed on Way Down La Spezia in Italy Hit on Return Trip

London, June 21—(AP)—A new technique of air bombardment was demonstrated dramatically by several squadrons of R.A.F. Lancasters which early today completed a shuttle round trip from Britain to Africa, bombing a German target on the way down and an Italian port on the way home without loss of a single plane.

The air ministry disclosed that the aircraft which devastated three acres of the old Zeppelin works at Friedrichshafen Sunday night continued by a south African base, and returned home last night by way of La Spezia, blasting the naval base at the latter port.

This shuttle technique never was used before on a large scale at long range.
